**Extradition Fund Gone.**  
OLYMPIA, Wash., March 16.—Failure of the legislature to provide a deficiency appropriation of \$950 for the extradition fund has caused Governor Lister to send a letter to the prosecuting attorneys of each county to the effect that in case they desire to extradite fugitives they must guarantee to pay expenses of such extradition until April 1, when the appropriation for the next biennium becomes available. Guarantees signed by the county commissioners must accompany the requisitions for extradition.
