This is really the extreme top of the market with the possible exception of a load of pulp stuff which may be occasionally sold at a fractional advance over this.

The steers that sold today at \$7.50 were among the best quality arrivals in the local yards recently, thereby indicating that aside from the Idaho pulp goods, in which killers have been interested in the market will not reach above that figure.

WHEAT TRADE HAS STRENGTH

(Thursday's Market.) PORTLAND, Ore.—News regarding the Dardanelles was of intense interest to the local as well as the general American trade today. The fact that practically no headway is being made in forcing an entrance into the straits—as indicated by today's reports—has caused a generally optimistic feeling among both holders and buyers of wheat.

Despite the alleged weakness occasionally expressed in cash wheat and cargo prices from London and Liverpool, the fact remains that Europe is eagerly seeking supplies. It is even intimated by the grain trade that the showing of force against the Dardanelles was more to bring down the price of wheat in the United States, Canada, Argentina and India, than to secure actual entrance.

Resales of wheat ships recently loaded here are now confirmed at an advance of moment. Buyers abroad are grabbing all supplies offered and more reselling has been shown recently than since the war started. All were made at better prices than original transactions, indicating along a growing strength for the grain abroad.

Sales included, 15,000 bushels May blue-stem, \$1.42; 5000 bushels April blue-stem, \$1.42; 5000 bushels May blue-stem, \$1.42 1/2.

Oats bids for spot delivery were 50c a ton lower, too, with barley off \$1, with no sales in either line on the exchange during the session.

President Sells Cotton. WASHINGTON, March 18.—President Wilson sold a bale of cotton and sent the proceeds to charity in Oklahoma.

During the "buy-a-bale-of-cotton" movement the president bought several bales and one now is in storage at Poswell, Okla. H. M. Conway, of Paris, Tex., offered to buy it at 10 cents a pound and the president accepted his offer and directed that the proceeds be sent to charity in Oklahoma, to be selected by Senators Gore and Owen.

British Officer Lost Big. LONDON, Mar. 18.—The British casualties list for the five days from March 10 to March 14, inclusive, during which the battles of Neuve Chapelle and St. Etloi were fought, show that 112 officers were killed or died from wounds and that 193 officers were wounded or are missing. The list of casualties among the men has not been given out, but some competent critics estimate them at about two-thirds of those suffering by the Germans which Field Marshal Sir John French, the British commander-in-chief, said were between 17,000 and 18,000. One Canadian officer was killed in the fighting and three Canadian officers were wounded.
