NEW COUNCIL OF UMATILLA TAKES UP GOVERNMENT

STANDING COMMITTEES AND OTHER OFFICIALS ARE APPOINTED.

UMATILLA, Ore., March 20.—(Special.)—Monday night the council met under the new city administration after a long period of uncertainty.

Mayor Starcher appointed J. A. Stephens, present incumbent, as chief of police. This appointment was confirmed by the council. No agreement was reached as to a city attorney.

Standing committees as follows were appointed:
Finance—F. W. Cline, E. J. Anthony, E. E. Shaw.
Police—R. G. Evans, T. S. Tillson, E. J. Anthony.

Streets—A. G. Means, F. W. Cline, E. E. Shaw.

March 27th was set as a clean-up day. All streets and vacant lots will then be cleaned and all debris hauled away. This is the first step taken in a general improvement plan, getting the city in readiness for the open river celebration May 4th.

At a recent meeting of the Commercial Club a new set of by-laws was adopted and officers elected. D. R. Brownell was elected president; W. A. Ford, vice president; J. H. Sommers, secretary, and F. W. Cline, treasurer.

The chairmen of the various standing committees with the officers elected constitute an executive committee.

President Brownell appointed the following chairmen: C. G. Brownell, Earl Brownell, Carl Brownell and two others; E. E. Starcher and A. B. Stephens, Jr.

French Attack Trenches.

BERLIN, March 15.—(Wireless via Sayville)—The French are attacking the German trenches in the Champagne district it was officially announced by the war office. Attacks west of Perthes have been unsuccessful but the French assaults north of Menseil are being continued it was declared. The French have been driven from their positions on the southwest slope on the plateau of Vauquois, Two

French attacks failed north of Point-a-Mousson, it was stated.

The Germans have captured a cliff northwest of Arras after a three days battle. The British losses were heavy. Artillery duels continue in the Vosges region. There were no important developments in Poland. Russian forces which appeared near the Prussian frontier at Tilsit have been repulsed.

Sheriff's Pay is \$54,000.

NEW YORK, March 18.—Next to the president of the United States the sheriff of New York county probably receives more money for his services than any other public official in America, according to figures made public recently by Leonard M. Wallstein, commissioner of accounts, in a report to Mayor Mitchell.

Since 1905, the report asserts, the sheriff of the county has received fees totaling \$402,329, in addition to \$12,000 a year salary—an average annual income of more than \$54,000. Half the fees turned into the sheriff's office are turned in to the sheriff.

The report was made to place data before the mayor for use in his consideration of a bill to limit the sheriff's compensation to a salary.

Medford Has Many Fires.

MEDFORD, Ore., March 18.—Medford has had a series of fires. Since Saturday night six fires have occurred in different parts of the town and in each case the building was burned to the ground. The total loss is estimated at \$15,000.

Saturday the Walter Erskine and D. C. Cole residences burned Sunday the Vierbeck grocery on East Main street was gutted and Monday the Gates garage was scorched and a vacant house in North Medford burned to the ground. Members of the fire department are inclined to scout the fire-bug theory and declare the epidemic of conflagrations to be merely a coincidence.

Aberdeen Has 21-Year-Old Pythian.

ABERDEEN, Wash., March 19.—James M. Gillies, a drug clerk, Wishkah Lodge, No. 44, Knights of Pythias of this city, believes it has the youngest Pythian ever initiated into the order. Gillies will take his third degree and be a full-fledged Pythian when he will be only eight days over his majority. Gillies took his first and second degrees last Friday at which time he was only 21 years and one day old.
