Saloon Man Is Sued.

G. M. Jonas today filed suit through his attorney, B. L. Ballard, against H. H. Alexander, proprietor of the Corner Saloon of Athena, for \$500 alleged to be due from the sale of the stock and fixtures of the place. Mr. Jonas having been the previous owner.

Student Injures Hand.

Wilbur Bradley, one of the local high school boys is suffering from a lame hand. Young Bradley was working in the manual training department yesterday when he ran a large splinter of wood forcibly into his hand which he had to have cut out by a physician, inflicting a severe wound.

Files Teacher's Contract.

W. A. Ford, who has been teaching in the Umatilla high school during the past year, is here today and filed with County Superintendent Young a contract for the next year. He states that there is a probability that two more teachers will be added next year to the Umatilla schools.

Suit to Enforce Contract.

To force M. J. Morris and J. A. Julien to fulfill the terms of a contract entered into with him for a trade of property, Loren Seward today filed suit against them. Morris and Julien were to transfer a contract to purchase 2000 acres in the west end of the county, according to the terms of the contract, the land having previously been contracted for by Thomas V. Hardin from W. J. Furnish. J. B. Hosford and Fee and Fee are plaintiff's attorneys.

Martin Estate Probated.

The will of John Martin, who died in Walla Walla March 1, but who left 480 acres of farm land in this county valued at \$42,000, was admitted to probate in the local county court this morning. It had previously been probated in the Walla Walla superior court. Mrs. Margaret Winship of Athena, a daughter of the deceased, is named administrator for the estate in Umatilla county and E. A. Reser, F. M. Stubblefield and D. Clem Donnelly are named appraisers.

Cut Worm Cutting Up.

Farmers living west of Birch creek are encountering a new enemy in the form of a cut worm which is working in the wheat. The first report of the depredations by the pest was brought to the city this forenoon by Charles Olcott who brought a number of the worms with him and shipped them to A. B. Cordley, director of the experiment station at Corvallis who is asked to advise about what to do to escape the evil. According to Mr. Olcott he found the cut worms working on the edge of his place. On the James Eldridge place the worms have taken 35 acres and Mr. Eldridge is planning to reseed. The cut worm is dark green in color and is from two to three inches long.

Scheel Still Insane.

Though an expert from Seattle had been here but a few days ago to testify that Rudolph Scheel, well known reservation farmer who was adjudged insane several months ago,

had entirely recovered, a letter received this morning from Dr. Williamson, head of the private sanatorium where Scheel is taking treatment, states that he is still mentally deficient. According to the steps taken to restore him to full management of his affairs have been stopped and Judge J. A. Fee will be retained as his guardian.

Made the Night Hideous.

Patrons of the library last evening as well as the regular firemen had their peace and quiet sadly shattered by the ribald singing and boisterous outcries of one Charles Bergman who had been put in jail. This morning he was sentenced to stay five days in the jail.

Dog Licenses Are Due.

Dog owners of Pendleton, unless they want their pets to fall into the clutches of Harry Hart, had best be making their peace with the city by paying in the annual license fee before April 1. The authorities generally give the citizens until the first Monday in April to make voluntary payment and after that persuasive measures are taken.

High School Plans Complete.

The Pendleton school board is now advertising for bids for the construction of a concrete wall about two sides of the high school block, for concrete steps and walks leading up to the building. F. B. Hayes drew the plans and made the specifications for the improvements, donating his services and working during the evenings.

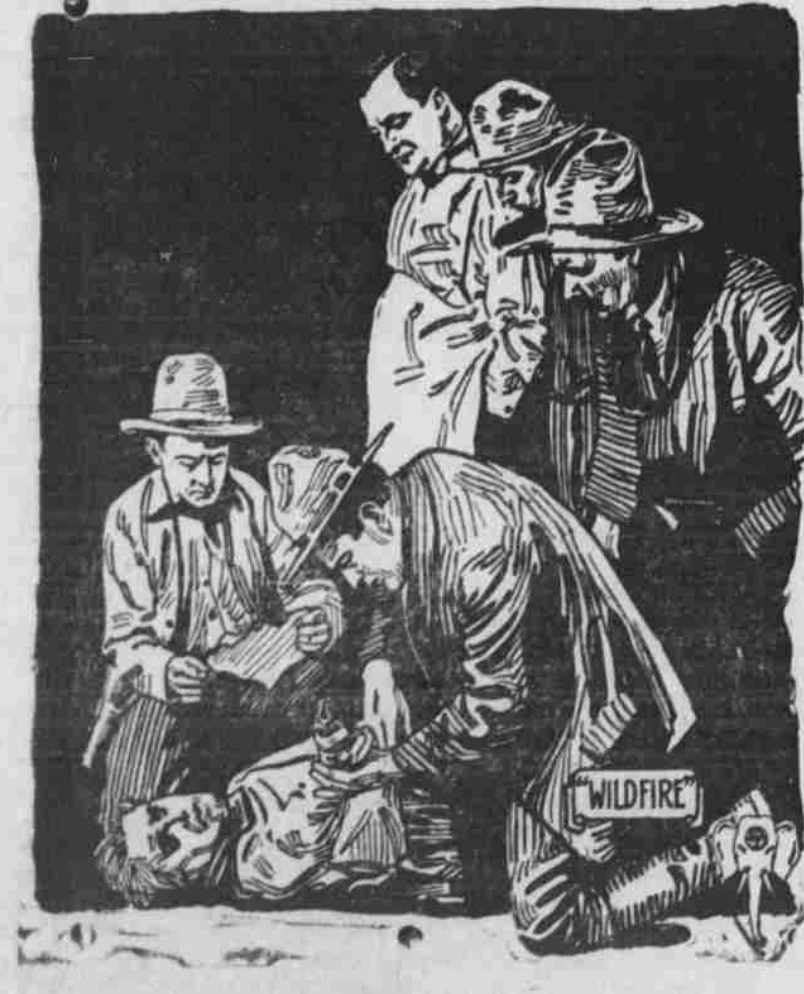
