present railroads and pay for them in 21 years out of the earnings. They did not propose to put bonds on the market but to issue government securities in payment.

Government Not Ready.
 The negative did not attack the argument of the affirmative, allowing it to stand practically for what it was worth on its face. Instead, the Enterprise boys contended that the time was not ripe for the government to take over the railroads, already being involved in several mammoth undertakings such as the building of the Panama canal. Admitting the abuses of private management, they laid particular stress upon the correction of these evils by government regulation. One great objection to government ownership, they contended, would be that the changing of the administration of a democracy would tend to destroy all continuity of policy in conducting the business. The affirmative answered this argument by proposing that the railroads should be handled by a commission of six men who would be appointed for life, thus taking the handling of the business out of politics.
 Osmer E. Smith, local attorney, presided at the debate which was attended by a small audience.
