KRON PRINZ WILHELM TO GO INTO DRYDOCK

NEWPORT NEWS, Va., April 15.—Captain Thierfelder of the German converted cruiser Kron Prinz Wilhelm, reiterated that he would not return the vessel voluntarily. "I, myself, will not return," exclaimed the commander.

A similar stand, it was said, was taken by Commander Thierfelder of the Prinz Eitel Friedrich, until the Berlin government ordered the Eitel's internment, deciding against a dash through the corridor of allied warships off the Virginia Capes.

Authorization to take the cruiser into drydock Friday was given to Commander Thierfelder by Collector Hamilton. Her condition is such that it will require three weeks, it is said, to complete repairs.

Knowledge of the whereabouts or operations of the German cruiser Karlsruhe, which had sought allied merchant ships in the Atlantic Ocean was disclaimed by Captain Thierfelder.

"We have not heard from the Karlsruhe," he said. "She was my ship and it would be nice for her to come in here. She has done so many fine things in the war that such a course would be like her."

**Pence May Be Democratic Secretary**  
WASHINGTON, April 15.—Thomas J. Pence, now in charge of the headquarters of the democratic national committee, probably will be named to succeed Federal Commissioner Davies as secretary of the committee. Homer S. Cummings of Connecticut, vice-chairman of the committee, discussed the political situation with President Wilson and later said he understood Mr. Pence was generally favored for the secretaryship.

**EMPEROR WILLIAM IS VISITOR AT VIENNA**  
GENEVA, via Paris, April 15.—Information has reached Geneva tending to confirm the reports that Emperor William paid a visit late last month to Emperor Francis Joseph. According to this information, Emperor William hastily determined to visit Emperor Francis Joseph on receiving from Prince von Ruslow, German ambassador to Italy, a message to the effect that negotiations between Austria and Italy concerning territorial concessions by Austria as the price of Italy's neutrality had failed. QUARANTINE ON STOCK SLIGHTLY MODIFIED

DALLAS, Tex., April 15.—The quarantine against the world adopted a few months ago by Texas to protect this state from the introduction of the foot and mouth disease was slackened partly today. Interchange of cattle without quarantine restrictions was permitted between Texas, Arizona, New Mexico and Colorado, in accordance with an agreement entered into by representatives of these states at the recent American Live Stock association convention in San Francisco.
