### TURKS ARE DRIVEN OFF BY THE BRITISH

LONDON, April 15.—The Turks, according to an official report issued by the India office, who had collected a force of 11,000 regulars, with 14 guns and some 12,000 Kurds and Arabs, attacked the British positions at Kurma Ahwah and Shaiba, in Mesopotamia, March 12.  
They were driven off, however, leaving 300 prisoners and two guns in the hands of the British. The British casualties, according to the report, were 92 men wounded.

The report is that Bulgaria a month ago was assured that the allies intend to carry the operations against the Dardanelles to a successful conclusion at any cost. Bulgaria then made a tentative agreement, according to reports current here, to send forces into Turkey to aid in the capture of Constantinople.  
The entrance of Bulgaria into the scene of action, according to information I have received, will remove the principal barrier that halted Greece. Greece is allied with Serbia and Roumania in a treaty to maintain the territorial divisions made by the treaty of Bucharest at the close of the second Balkan war. This divi-
