SCATTERED RANCHERS COOPERATE AND MAKE A THRIVING DISTRICT

SMALL FRUIT FARMS TAKE PLACE OF LARGE WHEAT FIELDS IN OHLAND.

Federal Reclamation Service Points With Pride to Development of California Project—It Preaches the Success of Cooperation—Farms Now Are 40 Acres Each.

(By a United Press Correspondent.) WASHINGTON, April 21.—The federal reclamation service points with pride to the development of the Ohland project in California. It preaches the success of cooperation in irrigation. Preceding the opening of the project the region was one vast wheat field with ranches far apart marked by ramshackle dwellings. The community was described as dead. Today it is called one of the inspiring young districts of the Pacific coast.

Small farms, 40 acres or so, have taken the place of the big wheat ranches and the farms are adorned by attractive homes. Fine dairy herds graze and the roadways are lined with shade and fruit trees. The community spirit provides enjoyable social life.

Ohrland's dairy industry took \$90,000 from the creamery in the past year and the creamery declared a 10 per cent dividend for the benefit of the 34 dairymen composing it.

Speaking of dairying, on the Umattilla, Oregon, project, live dairymen have organized an association to improve the stock and encourage the purchase of more milk cows. Herdman has a creamery that has been unable thus far to supply the demand.

A policeman's whistle for the use of the farmer's wife is becoming a recognized farm utility in some sections. It works fine, since a good one can be heard to the furthest corner of the average farm. If she wants the head of the family, the wife blows one blast; for the eldest son, two blasts; next oldest three and so following. Then, too, many wives have emergency signals in case of trouble.

Cowycne School on the Yakima project in Washington, has a splendid rural high school that is proving to possess nearly all the advantages that is claimed this form of school would have. This year dairymen was the first agricultural subject taken up and already the boys are becoming very proficient in the use of a cream-testing outfit. A. L. Lashbrook, U. S. field agent in dairying, recently spent a week in the valley, lecturing and every lecture was largely attended, as were his inspection trips. Another specialist was due to make a visit this month.

The feeling in the community is that the farmers' high school does a great deal to aid in solving problems and to make farms profitable and farm homes pleasant.

Miss Serene Helen Blue, age 27, paid the government ten cents for the deed to the smallest homestead in the United States. It is located at Turtle Lake, Minn., and is just 139 feet by 33 feet in dimension.

64,000 ACRES MAY BE OPENED FOR FARMLAND

EX-GOVERNOR WEST SEEKS CANCELLATION OF CAREY GRANT IN BAKER.

BAKER, Ore., April 20.—Steps have been taken which, if carried through, will compel the Powder Land & Irrigation Company to give up its proposed plan of carrying the Thiel valley project, in the Powder valley northeast of Baker, to completion. It will mean that if successful the 64,000 acres now tied up by the company will be thrown open by the proceedings to entry and there is a possibility that if the Powder Valley Company's contract is cancelled a co-operative irrigation district will be organized.

Acting upon the request of several families in the Lower Powder and North Powder districts and in Baker, ex-Governor West and Claude C. McCulloch, attorneys of Portland, have begun the preliminary work toward drafting a petition to the state desert land board at Salem to cancel the Powder Valley company's contract and to the interior department at Washington, D. C., to restore the lands to entry. It is expected that by the time the petitions are ready to be presented there will be at least 50 subscribers. It is thought they will be ready within 60 days. Mr. West will handle the matter at Washington. W. S. Levene is the Baker representative of the petitioners.

Failure of Other Projects Cited. The reasons given for the request for cancellation are that Carey act projects have proved unsuccessful, that the Powder Valley company has not done any work on the land, that it has shown itself unable to finance the project, and these lands having been idle and of no use to anyone for six years, should be thrown open to those who seek farming land.

Drya Move on Capitol. WASHINGTON, April 20.—One of the picturesque developments in the fight of the anti-liquor forces to secure nation-wide prohibition came to light here with the announcement that at the next Congress there will be an "On to Washington" movement of those who sympathize with the prohibition propaganda.

The plan is to have many thousands of men and women reach Washington on a concerted date and surround the capitol to give a demonstration of prohibition sentiment.

Hails Sent to Alaska. SEATTLE, Wash., April 20.—The first rails for the government railroad in Alaska were shipped on the steamer Mariposa, which sailed for Cook Inlet. The shipment consisted of two carloads to be used in building working terminals at Ship Creek, which will be the base for this season's operations. The Mariposa also carried large shipments of lumber, construction equipment and supplies for the Alaska Engineering commission.

Lieutenant Frederick Mears, of the Alaska Engineering commission, and 45 survivors were among the 291 passengers on the steamer.

Policewomen Tried in Britain. LONDON, April 20.—Brighton, England's most popular shore resort, is to replace its policemen—at least partially—with women this summer. The first detail of women patrolmen went on duty this month. They wear neat uniforms of dark blue serge, with helmets similar to ladies' riding hats. A large number of recruits are being instructed in first aid, stretcher work, signaling and gymnastics.
