 ROME, April 27.—A violent earthquake shocked the province of Potenza Monday. The people were thrown into a panic. No loss of life was reported.

7 WORKMEN KILLED
AS DYNAMITE EXPLODES
 WHITE PLAINS, New York, April 27.—Seven men were killed and twenty injured by a premature explosion of 12 sticks of dynamite in a deep trench during construction work here. The men were all foreign laborers working 100 feet below the surface of the earth excavating for a new dam.

Work on Landing Starts.
 VANCOUVER, Wash., April 24.—The pilerdriver to be used in the construction of the temporary ferry landing at the foot of Columbia street arrived. Work will begin at once.

A trestle will be built from the ferry landing to Second street at Washington street. A heavy plank road will be laid on stringers on top of the piling. The dredger is working away steadily excavating for the first pier on Hayden Island.

NORTHWEST FLOUR
WANTED IN EAST
 (Tuesday's Market.)
 PORTLAND, Ore.—Portland is securing a fair volume of Atlantic coast flour business as a result of the recent formation of the Atlantic-Pacific Flour company, a subsidiary of the Portland Flouring Mills company. Quite fair shipments are going forward by boat to New York, but it is stated that most of the business is up and down the coast and not in New York city itself. Promoters of the new concern are confident that they will be able to bring regular business in this direction and thereby aid the general cereal situation.

Shipments of wheat to the east continue from interior Pacific northwest points. Interior prices are in reality higher than tidewater for the reason that the freight rate from there to the east and central west is lower than by rail from the coast. While the steamer rate from here is slightly lower than grain rate from the interior, still there is no freight room available.

SHARP LOSS IN
WHEAT FORCED
 (Tuesday's Market.)
 CHICAGO, Ill.—Wheat closed 1 3/8 @ 2 5/8c lower. Lower prices ruled in the pit today. Wheat opened unsettled. May started with a drop of 3/8c. July was up 1/2c and September opened 1/8c lower. Later in the trading there was a general decline. Foreigners were on both sides of the market in a small way. The export demand was quiet. Weakness in the Winnipeg market was reflected in the market here.
 The cash demand was very poor. The market turned heavy and offerings were free.
 Selling was of a large volume, local traders pressed the market and liquidation was much in evidence.
 At the close July wheat was 2 5/8c lower, September dropped 1 1/2c and May finished with a decline of 1/2 5/8c. Corn and oats sagged in sympathy with wheat. Provisions closed unsettled.
