## Stories From the War Zone

**NORTHERN FRANCE, April 12.**—(By Mail to New York.)—It's baseball time in France. Spring is here; the mud has gone; when a soldier isn't fighting he must be playing, and the only game a Canadian knows is baseball.

France is beholding baseball for the first time. England is playing it. The Canadians are the missionaries of baseball, behind the allied lines, and they get so much out of it that the French and the English are beginning to believe that it is really a good game, after all.

The English cricket players, in a dozen places behind the English lines, have thrown away their cricket pads and are taking up the baseball bat, with the Canadians.

Morning, noon and night, there are baseball games going on behind the lines, wherever a few Canadians are gathered together. Sometimes the game is one-old-cat; sometimes it's only knocking up flies. But, at certain times, there have been inter-company baseball games, with hundreds of dollars of good Canadian money staked on the result and with English and French officers betting as enthusiastically as anybody else.

"Cricket's a ceremony; baseball's a game," said one English colonel, who has been converted to baseball. "You have to have a large number of men to play cricket and it takes a long time to play a game, but with this odd game of baseball you can start with any number of men and play as long or as short a game as you please. And you get results quickly."

"Why, do you know," he continued, "half a dozen fellows can get out their bat and ball and have a ripping time for half an hour, any old time, while one can't have that sort of fun at cricket impromptu, sort of, don't you know?"

Beyond a doubt, the Canadians are the missionaries of the game of baseball. Their work is done, unconsciously, too. They don't beg the English to drop cricket. They just get out with a ball and a bat and the English join in the fun. And the result is that more than one English chap, who gets back to England alive will set out to teach the game of baseball to his English friends.

It is not in France alone that baseball is being played by the Canadians. At the Canadian camps in England there have been some hot games, witnessed by Englishmen. The convalescent soldiers in Canadian hospitals in England, bring themselves back to strength by the exercise of baseball and it's safe to say that there are 20 feet at present in England, for which are radiating the deadly germs of the baseball disease.

The chief difficulty the Canadians have, in their missionary work, is a lack of baseballs. They've used rubber balls and now and then they find a cricket ball, but it's a regular baseball their palms are itching for. Any baseball fan knows that baseball is rather silly without a baseball, you'll use what you can find in its stead.

Baseballs, just to drop a hint, make neat parcel post packages. And a baseball, in its square box, addressed to "The Canadian Expeditionary Force, for Baseball Players," will find its way, sure as a good throw to second, into the palm of a Canadian catcher.

It was the civil war that distributed baseball in America. It was first a New York game. The New York soldiers played it wherever they went. Before long it was being played throughout the union lines, and when the war was ended the soldiers carried the game to every corner of the new union.

Who says the Canadians can't carry baseball throughout Europe, even into Germany?

### LAWSON ALLEGED TO HAVE ADMITTED SHOTS

TRINIDAD, Colo., April 27.—John R. Lawson, late in the afternoon of October 25, 1913, armed with a rifle and pistol, came from the Colorado & Southeastern Railroad cut near which John Nimmo on that same day was shot to death, according to the testimony of Charles Snyder.

Lawson said "My God, is anybody hurt here?" Snyder swore, after he had related how he, as an agent of the United Mine Workers of America, had gone in an automobile loaded with ammunition to the scene of the battle between strikers and deputy sheriffs, in which Nimmo was killed.

Lawson, District 15, executive board member of the United Mine Workers, is on trial charged with the murder of John Nimmo, one of the deputies.

Duties Secret, Says Witness.  
Former witnesses for the state had testified that Nimmo was shot by men in the railroad cut, shortly before dark, while he was advancing on the position said to have been held by the strikers.

Snyder described himself as an ex-member of the United Mine Workers. He said that about the time the recent strike of Colorado coal miners was called, he had been employed by Lawson, E. L. Doyle, secretary-treasurer of District 15; Frank J. Hayes, international vice president of district 15, and other union officers to serve as secret agent and also as body guard for Lawson and other union leaders. After a time, he testified, he discontinued his alleged services as secret agent, but continued to be bodyguard and purchaser of arms and ammunition for the strikers.

**Wife Must Pay Alimony.**  
LOS ANGELES, Cal., April 28.—Mrs. Mary F. Krause, must pay H. H. Krause \$40 per month alimony pending trial of her suit for divorce. This was the ruling of Superior Judge Monroe here.

Krause, defending the suit, testified that his wife owns a rooming house and that he makes the beds, sweeps the rooms, washes dishes and performs other work usually done by a maid. He also said his wife owns

considerable property but he has no money. The court told Krause he could remain in the shelter of his wife's home and receive support from her or that they could live apart and she must pay him \$40 per month alimony. If he remains with his wife she must feed and clothe him properly, else he can complain to the court that he is underfed.

### Militia Demonstration.

NEW YORK, April 30.—An elaborate demonstration of practical military work will be given tonight by New York's militia at the 47th Regiment Armory. The whole state guard is invited. Maj. Gen. John F. O'Riyan in charge, hopes to present the advantages of dirt over wood floors for armories.
