Rebels Defeat Italians.
TRIPOLI, May 6.—The losses of the Italians, commanded by Colonel Mirani, who were attacked by a rebel band south of Syrta, April 29, and were forced to retreat owing to the desertion of irregulars to the rebels, were 15 officers and 200 men killed and missing.

Four hundred men wounded during the engagement have been placed on board a steamer and sent to Syracuse, Sicily.
