Word reaches here from Canyon City that Ben Colvin, prominent Ritter rancher, will go to trial on a perjury charge on May 20, the court having set that date. Col. J. H. Raley of this city and Otis Patterson of Canyon City will defend him.

Administrator Appointed.

F. B. Swartz of Hermiston has been appointed administrator of the estate of the late William Glasson who died at Hermiston April 13 leaving an estate in and around that town valued at \$9000. The appointment was made upon the petition of C. R. Glasson of Florence, Colorado, only child of the deceased, who is here now.

Auto Club Meets Tomorrow.

President Ritner of the Umatilla County Automobile Club, announces a meeting for tomorrow afternoon at 4 o'clock in the Pendleton Commercial association rooms. One of the matters to be taken up will be a proposal from a man now in the city to get out an auto directory for Umatilla county. The by-laws of the association will also be submitted.

Milton High School Closes.

County Superintendent I. E. Young returned this morning from Milton where last evening he attended the graduating exercises of the Milton high school and presented the diplomas to the 12 graduates. Eleven of the 12 graduates started in the high school when Prof. Young was the Milton superintendent and it was upon their request that he delivered the diplomas. The commencement address was made by Dean Proctor of Pacific University.

West End is Soaked.

Assessor C. P. Strain arrived home last evening from the west end of the county and reports that that section has been soaked by the recent rains until there are puddles of water standing in the sands. The government observer announces that over two inches of rain has fallen around Pendleton during the present stormy spell. Mr. Strain states that last Sunday there was a precipitation of .46 of an inch in less than half an hour at Hermiston, part of the precipitation being hail which did some damage to the fruit.

Pigott Secures Promotion.

J. J. Pigott, attendant in charge of the receiving ward at the Eastern Oregon State Hospital since its establishment, left today for McNelly's Island, Wash., accompanied by Mrs. Pigott and children, to accept an advance of salary a position as attendant in the federal prison there. Mr. Pigott has been in the service of this state for five years, having been at Salem before coming here. He secured his new position through a civil service examination in which he ranked highest of all those taking the test. The examination was open to applicants from five states and Mr. Pigott had an average grade of 95 per cent.

NO PREPARATIONS.

Anxious waiting, coupled with a policy of absolute silence was the attitude of the administration. The developments in what the president has characterized as a "grave situation" no longer are in the president's hands. The center of activity has been transferred to Berlin. The last word has been said by the United States. Hereafter American life must be made safe. That is all the United States asks and to make American lives safe, Germany must cease submarine and aerial attacks upon merchantmen carrying American or flying the American flag. Officials refused to say whether they were hopeful or pessimistic over the outcome.

Government officials by the president's orders, are keeping silent. Comment would not only be superfluous but possibly dangerous. It is for the United States to help Germany reach a decision and she will weigh the recollection of years of friendship and decide whether it is to be interrupted. There will be no haste in pressing for a reply to the American note. High officials pointed out that the note was not an ultimatum but it is expected that Germany will lose no time in considering it. Time must be allowed, however, for conditions of war and not of peace, as the kaiser is much at the front.

OLD RESIDENT OF UMATILLA COUNTY CALLED BY DEATH

MERRITT LEWIS WARREN DIES SUDDENLY AT FARM HOME NEAR PENDLETON.

Merritt Lewis Warren, for 25 years a resident of Umatilla county, died suddenly at 6 o'clock this morning at his farm home 15 miles southwest of Pendleton in the Coombs' Canyon locality. He had been slightly ill for several weeks but yesterday was feeling so well that he was about his work. This morning at 4 o'clock he awoke and was seized with a violent illness which resulted in death two hours later. Heart trouble is given as the cause.

Mr. Warren was 43 years old, having been born August 29, 1871. He came west to California in 1882 and seven years later moved to Umatilla county where he has since followed farming. For a number of years he lived on Tutuilla street in this city. He is survived by a widow, Mary Johnson Warren and five children, Ray M., Dwight G. and Walker C. Warren and Mrs. Dick Shaw, all living in the Coombs canyon district, and Mrs. Charles Owen of Haldman. The funeral will be held at the Folsom chapel in this city tomorrow afternoon at 2 o'clock. Deceased was a member of the United Artisans and that lodge will have charge.
