Another small cloud burst visited this section last week washing trenches in the roads, and floating the road in front of the Nolin Post Office.

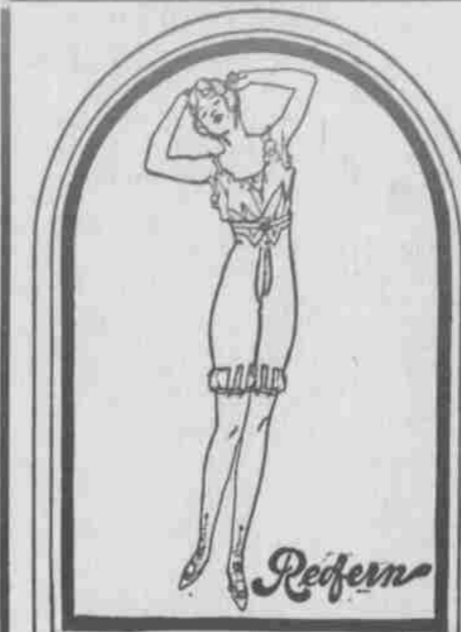
The recent rains have been of untold benefit to the farmers. What is commencing to head and the prevailing weather has overcome the damage done by frost and cut worms several weeks ago.

German Members Ousted. LONDON, May 14.—Between 200 and 300 British members of the Stock Exchange have mobilized to prevent forcibly if necessary, the entry of any Germans who might be brave enough to attempt to make their way into the house in disregard of the warning issued by the Stock Exchange committee advising them to remain away.

Excitement ran high around the exchange, and a huge crowd collected in the vicinity in the expectation of disorders. Only a handful of naturalized Germans appeared in the neighborhood, however, and they did not attempt to enter the exchange. They were hustled away and warned not to return.
