ENGLAND MAY HAVE TO FACE ATTEMPTED INVASION SOON

LONDON, May 21.—While the attention of the country is centered upon the formation of a coalition cabinet, suggestions that the new war ministry may have to solve the problem of resisting a German invasion were heard today. The Daily Mail editorially said: "It is possible the coalition cabinet may be responsible to the country at the time of an actual attempted invasion. We do not believe for a moment the Germans are to keep their vast fleet of warships and transports rotting in idleness."

RAIN AIDS IRRIGATION IN WEST END SECTION

FRUIT OUTLOOK FINE; WHEAT FARMERS IN LINE FOR BUMPER YIELDS.

STANFIELD, Ore., May 21.—(Staff Correspondence.)—If the rains have injured the fruit in this section the facts are not noticeable. On the other hand the furnish project never looked more beautiful and the strawberries are at their best right now. The sun shone yesterday and was welcome, though the rain was beneficial in that it assisted the spring irrigation.

The alfalfa hay harvest will soon be under way in this portion of the county. Between Pendleton and Echo the grain fields never did look better than at present. The moisture has made the crop outlook exceptionally fine and unless something unforeseen happens this region will have a bumper wheat crop.

U. S. WILL STAND BACK OF PROTEST TO GREAT BRITAIN

WASHINGTON, May 21.—Secretary Bryan this afternoon said the United States stands squarely behind its original protest to Great Britain against the British order-in-council proclaiming a blockade against shipment of foodstuffs into Germany. Everything done thus far, he explained, has been by state department advisors acting unofficially in an effort to benefit American shippers.

WASHINGTON, May 21.—Secretary Bryan announced that Ambassador Bryan has confirmed the published reports that the British admiralty is taking action to settle immediately and satisfactorily to the owners all controversies regarding American cotton shipments detained at British ports. Only details regarding proof of ownership and contract prices remain to be disposed of.
