M'ADDO VINDICATED OF CHARGES MADE IN RIGGS BANK HEARING

COMPLETE VICTORY FOR THE GOVERNMENT IN CASE IS INDICATED.

One Point Is Taken Under Advice—No Evidence in the Record Presented to Prove Conspiracy and Malice on the Part of the Secretary of the Treasury.

WASHINGTON, May 22.—Declaring that he saw no evidence in the record presented him to prove conspiracy and malice on the part of Secretary of the Treasury McAdoo and Comptroller Williams, Justice McCoy denied practically all relief asked by the Riggs National bank of Washington, D. C., in its suit against the two government officials. The

only important exception to this ruling was in the matter of the 5000 penalty levied against the bank by Williams. This the justice took under advisement.

Justice McCoy also expressed his belief that Williams acted properly in removing government deposits from the Riggs National.

A controversy over conflicting affidavits delayed the resumption of former Senator Joseph Bailey's argument in the hearing.

The bank's affidavit impressed attorneys for the treasury department as seeking to disavow knowledge of the entries of the defunct brokerage firm of Lewis Johnson & Co., as suggesting stock transactions between this firm and the bank. Samuel Untermeyer termed the affidavit a "gross imposition upon the court, if not worse."

He offered a counter affidavit from the brokerage firm's bookkeeper to controvert it.

Attorneys for the Riggs bank again insisted that the institution "as a bank" never engaged in short selling or stock transactions.

Justice McCoy intimated he would go into the affidavits more fully later and Bailey was able to continue his arguments. He based his argument on legal and financial technicalities.

LABOR WARS MUST COME SAYS CLARENCE DARROW

WASHINGTON, May 21.—That "bloodshed is sometimes necessary," was the opinion given to the federal industrial relations commission by Clarence S. Darrow, the attorney who defended Moyer, Haywood and Pettibone at Boise, Idaho, and the McNamara brothers when they were tried at Los Angeles on charges of dynamiting the Los Angeles Times building.

"Do you believe in bloodshed?" Commissioner Weststock asked the witness who had just urged the pardon of John B. McNamara, now serving a term in San Quentin prison for the Times dynamiting.

"Sometimes it is necessary," Darrow replied. "We have reached a point where a change in our system must come. I don't think we live in a free country—not nearly as free as it was 50 years ago."

Under questioning by Commissioner, Darrow said he received \$35,000 for defending Moyer, Haywood and Pettibone, \$10,000 for his work in the anthracite coal case and \$48,000 for defending John and James McNamara, "which I immediately spend in defending myself," he added.

Half in Dundee Is Rising.

DUNDEE, Ore., May 22.—Work began on the foundation of the public hall, which is being built by the Dundee Women's Club and the Boys' Amusement Club. The plans and specifications provide for a hall 40 by 70 feet a club room for the Dundee Women's Club and one of the Boys' Club, besides a confectionery store.

More than \$1300 cash has been subscribed besides donations of labor, which will insure its completion in the near future.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier Addresses Clubs. TORONTO, Ont., May 21.—Sir Wilfrid Laurier will address the Liberal Club Federation of Ontario, in this city at the Federation's annual dinner.

Sir Wilfrid is also scheduled to make another address in Toronto. He is expected to speak at the Provincial Women's Liberal Association, which holds its annual meeting here.

Mines Think in Channel. NEW YORK, May 21.—The Atlantic transport liner Minnehaha, from London with 17 passengers, docked here after an uneventful voyage.

"The British admiralty," said Captain Claret, "has checked the English channel between Dover and Calais with mines, nets and other obstructions until a channel only a third of a mile wide is open. German submarines cannot get into the channel from the North sea and must skirt the north of Scotland to reach their field of operations, off the Irish coast."
