AUSTRIA INVADED BY ITALIANS; FOUR TOWNS ARE SEIZED

Goritz is Now Threatened, 22 Miles Northwest of Trieste--Invaders Encounter Little Opposition in Drive Into Austrian Territory--Cavalry and Infantry Advance Along Judnio and Isonzo Rivers, Both Wings of Army Operating Against Enemy--Another Army is Moving North From the Adriatic.

ROME, May 25.—Italian troops crossed the frontier today and invaded Austria. They occupied four towns, seized important heights and now are threatening the town of Goritz, 22 miles northwest of Trieste.

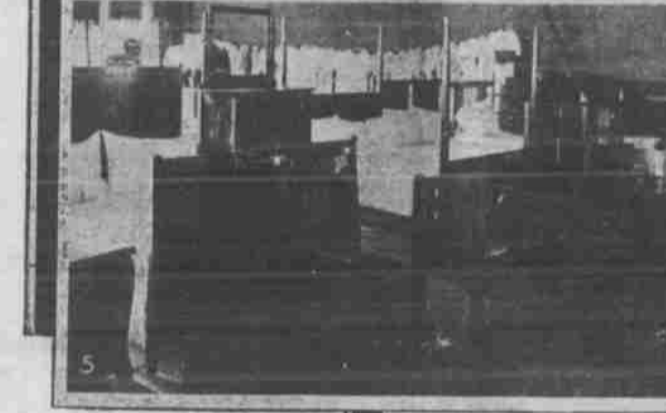

She has not only had experience in teaching in all grades but has served in the capacity of assistant supervisor in a city larger than Pendleton and has also taught normal work. Her work during the past year as instructor in the teachers' training classes has proved to the board her abilities.

Result of Battle East of Ypres Remains in Doubt; British Lines Still Hold

PARIS, May 25.—For more than 24 hours British and German forces to the east of Ypres have been locked in a desperate battle. The result is still in doubt. The Germans are delivering fierce attacks against the English lines. Some British trenches were captured but the enemy was driven out with heavy losses, it was declared.

NEUTRALITY PROCLAMATION ISSUED BY THE PRESIDENT

WASHINGTON, May 25.—The president's proclamation of neutrality relative to Austria and Italy was issued by the state department today. The president's proclamation is along the conventional lines and is no different from those which preceded it when other European nations declared war.

School Board Adds Forging to Manual Training Studies

ITALIAN CAVALRY ATTACKS OUTPOST ACROSS FRONTIER

Austrians Forced to Retire After Sharp Engagement--Austrian Post Shelled by Destroyer.

TWO OF THE ENEMY KILLED

Much Damage Is Done by Italian Shells Which Wreck a Military Barracks--47 Prisoners Are Taken--Details Lacking of Naval Fight in the Adriatic Sea.

ROME, May 25.—The first land engagement involving a great number of troops in the Italian and Austrian war was announced by the war office today. Italian cavalry crossed the border in the Isonzo district and attacked a strong Austrian outpost.

An Italian destroyer shelled the harbor of Porto Buso, Austria, inflicting heavy damage. Two of the enemy were killed.

A motorboat flotilla was sunk and the quay and landing stage and a military barracks were destroyed, it was officially stated. The destroyer withdrew after taking 47 prisoners, including one officer and 15 non-commissioned officers. The enemy lost two killed during the bombardment. There were no casualties aboard the destroyer which carried the prisoners to Venice.

Unconfirmed reports were circulated of an engagement along the Adige river near Rivola. The Austrians were declared to have shelled Italian outposts without casualties. It was officially stated a German ship was sunk by the Austrian shell fire during the bombardment of Ancona.

LONDON, May 25.—With all Italian dispatches heavily censored, it is impossible to get further details from Rome regarding the naval engagement in the Adriatic in which an Italian squadron was reported to have sunk three small Austrian vessels. The Corriere D'Italia was suppressed at the order of the government censors for printing unofficial details of the defeat of the Austrians.

King of Italy Off for Front

ROME, May 25.—The king left for the front early today, accompanied by his staff and escorted by cuirassiers. Huge crowds lined the streets, cheering and waving flags. The monarch was accorded a remarkable ovation.

CITY ROAD ROLLER IS AT WORK IN WEST END

Through action taken by County Judge C. H. Marsh the people of the west end of the county now have a steam road roller for use in putting their new roads into shape. The roller is the property of the city of Pendleton and has been secured by the county on a rental basis, three dollars per day being paid, which according to Judge Marsh is cheaper than owning another roller.

The two rollers belonging to the county are in use on the macadam road work near Milton and hence neither could be sent to the west end at this time. The city roller will be used on roads in the vicinity of Echo, Stanfield and Hermiston.
