CONDITIONS FOR WHEAT ARE GOOD

(Thursday's Market.)
PORTLAND, Ore.—Wheat crop conditions in central Oregon are well high ideal, at this time. Every returning visitor to the great wheat belt recently has been loud in his praise of the excellence of the crop outlook. Sherman county especially has come in for unstinted praise.

"I never saw the wheat crop condition in Sherman county or anywhere in central Oregon so good as at this time," says C. S. Jackson, publisher of The Journal, who was at Wasco yesterday, attending the reception given Sam Hill, the good roads booster.

"Sherman county has good farmers," says Mr. Jackson. "They are farming better there now than when I lived at Pendleton 13 years ago. The ground has been placed in an unusually favorable condition and the wheat growers are getting results in good crops. Adversity has taught them the way."

With ship charter rates of milder higher and higher and establishing new high records almost every day, the market price for wheat here is affected, especially as foreign markets are showing weakness and lower prices instead of following the advances being forced by the higher freights.

That the orient is again about to enter the wheat market here is indicated by the receipt of a cable from Japan by Leo Peterson, publisher of the Commercial Review, asking for information regarding liberal supplies.

The first sale of July delivery wheat on the Portland Merchants Exchange this season was made today when 5000 bushels of that delivery bluestem were sold at \$1.15. Heretofore the bid and ask prices for July have been from 13 1/2c to 15c a bushel apart. Spot wheat bids on the exchange today were 1-2 to 2 1/2c a bushel lower, the weakness in May option of Chicago acting as a bearish factor.
Spot oats bids were unchanged with no sales. Spot barley down 50c a ton with no sales.
Bran bids for spot were down 25c a ton with no sales. Spot shorts unchanged. A sale of 100 tons June shorts was made at \$27.50.

There will be no session of the Exchange Monday, Memorial day.

Crew Allowed to Escape.
BEREHAVEN, Ireland, May 25—The British sailing ship Glenholm was sunk by a German submarine 15 miles off this port. Members of her crew have been landed here. The Glenholm was on her way from Chile to Liverpool with a cargo of nitrate. The submarine intercepted the sailing ship and signalled the crew to abandon her. The ship was then sunk, the submarine firing 39 rounds from her gun before she went down. Berehaven, or Castletown Barhaven, is on the southern coast of Ireland, on the north shore of Hentry Bay. The point where the Glenholm was sunk is roughly not more than 60 miles from Old Head of Kinsale, where the Lusitania went down.

Pope Condemns War.
LONDON, May 27.—A Central News dispatch from Rome declared the pope has written a letter to Cardinal Vannutelli expressing regret over the horrors of the war and condemning the "barbarous methods pursued on land and sea."

MAY WHEAT IS SHARPLY DOWN

(Thursday's Market.)
CHICAGO, May.—May wheat closed 5 1/4c off; July 7-8c up and September 1 3/8c up.

The grain trade was unsettled today. At the opening of the market July and September wheat options were higher. May wheat was down 1-4; July started with an advance of 5-3 and September was up 3-4.

Cash wheat was weak. Students in the pit regard the cash article as in the weakest position for months.

Values in the corn trade were somewhat higher at the opening. Corn prices closed irregular. May corn was off 5-8c at the close. July was off 3-8c and September finished with an advance of 1-3c. Oats were steady. Provisions closed higher.

Chicago, Ill., May 27.—Another sharp break in May wheat was recorded in the pit this afternoon. The prices dropped 7 3/4 cents, selling down to 11 3/4-1-4. When the market opened May sold at \$1.50. Both the July and September wheat options were carried down with May. July wheat fell 1 7/8, while September sold off 1 1/2.

Heavy selling caused the general decline. At the close there was some advance.
