(Courtesy Monday's Journal.) PORTLAND, Ore.—It was a waiting market all through the livestock trade at North Portland for the day. The week opened with the ideas of buyers and sellers apart. This was especially true of the swine division where buyers generally were offering \$7.75@7.85 for tops, while commission interests were holding out for \$8 straight.

General hog market range: Best light \$7.85@8.00, Medium light 7.70@7.75, Good to heavy 7.60@7.65, Rough to heavy 6.50@7.50. Cattle Trade Steady. General conditions in the cattle trade were safely steady. In fact, the market at North Portland started the week with a fractional improvement over last Monday. California cattle were again offering with some early sales of steers around \$7.50 for good stuff. Better stuff was reported around a dime better than that.
