CHICAGO, June 16.—Details of a \$20,000,000 merger of cement manufacturing concerns which Edward M. Hagar has been quietly organizing for the last four months, were announced here. Mr. Hagar retired from the presidency of the Universal Portland Cement company, controlled by the United States Steel corporation, in order to effect the merger. The company will be known as the Hagar Portland Cement company. Mr. Hagar will be president and the stock all will be common. The new company will, it is said, operate a chain of plants extending from the Atlantic seaboard to the Rocky mountains.

SHRINERS TO GATHER AT SEATTLE IN 41ST IMPERIAL SESSIONS

100,000 NOBLES AND THEIR FAMILIES ARE EXPECTED TO ATTEND.

Members Will Gather from Every Part of the Country and at Close of Convention Are Expected to Visit Many Northwest Points of Interest—150 Trains Expected.

SEATTLE, Wash., June 17.—Coming from every part of the country, 100,000 nobles and families of the Mystic Shrine will begin their pilgrimage late this month or early in July to the oasis of Seattle, where they will participate in the forty-first imperial council session.

Because of the many sights which the Shriners wish to take in while on their journey to the northwest, many of the temples will leave home several weeks before the opening date of the convention. In their special trains they will assemble at Seattle and after the meeting is over will distribute to every corner of the west.

A total of 150 special trains is expected. Fourteen special trains from the south will pour through Portland, Centralia, Chehalis and Tacoma, bringing the Oregon, California and southwest temples to the meeting. Thirty special trains will travel practically in one solid string from St. Paul westward, stopping at Spokane and crossing the Cascades by various routes.

One compact group of fourteen special trains will act as escort for the imperial potentate from Spokane to Seattle Monday, July 12, comprising the most magnificent escort ever given a citizen in this state. The assemblage of the escort will take place in Spokane, the trains leaving one after another in solid array.

After the council meeting, the special trains will either take their hordes south to California, stopping at Tacoma and Portland, as well as other points, or will go north through Everett, Bellingham and other points and going east via the Canadian Rockies.

"MAN WORTH WHILE" IS FAMOUS LECTURE TO BE GIVEN HERE

ROLAND A. NICHOLS WILL SPEAK AT CHAUTAUQUA SUNDAY EVENING, JUNE 27.

He is Conceded to Be One of the Strongest Lecturers on the Platform—His Talk Will Be Presented in Conjunction With the Noted Gullotta Trio Musicians.

Conceded to be one of the strongest lecturers on the Pendleton Chautauqua platform, Roland A. Nichols will deliver his wonderful lecture, "The Man Worth While," when he appears on the local program Sunday evening, June 27. He is to be presented in conjunction with the noted Gullotta trio, musicians of note.

It is no longer necessary to ask questions about Roland Nichols. Everyone acquainted with chautauqua work is conversant with the great works of this mighty speaker. Country bred, college trained and seasoned by twenty years of successful professional life, with a magnetic personality, a deep, sympathetic voice, a readiness of speech and a broad outlook on life, he brings a great message of inspiration to any community.

His lectures are not dry preachments. While he brings a fund of information and uplift there is such a constant flow of humor, illustrative incident and wholesome entertainment that when the lecture comes to a close, the audience does not realize he has been speaking for an hour and a half. His first lecture, and the one on which he has won his reputation, is the one to be delivered in Pendleton.

This lecture deals with the great problem of parentage, heredity, environment and kindred topics. The speaker handles the subject with the skill of a genius. He probes the various forms of social life. Cutting conceptions of life as it is and should be, paves the way for viril statements concerning the powerful range of heredity. He dwells upon the scope and extent of environment, showing its place in life and its influence upon the child. He pleads for the life of the child. No greater lecture is being given to chautauqua audiences this summer.

The importance of the home is emphasized. He tells the great responsibility that rests upon the mother and father. In crisp, short, burning sentences he shows what a fund of knowledge every parent should possess, but many never gain. The value of the school, its influence in the moulding of the character of the child and the vital part it plays in determining the future of the individual is brought out with excellent vividness.

He shows the true value of associations. "We are at the mercy of our associations," he states. "It is the great work of the home, the church and the school to build proper associations for the child. The fourth American institution, the chautauqua, is one of the strongest factors in this work."

"The American people must be progressive, cheerful, brave and enthusiastic if they are to meet the great problems facing them today. A thorough knowledge of the forms and facts of life will make the battle easier and the victory more sure."

Mr. Nichols will deliver but this one lecture while in Pendleton. He has been on the chautauqua circuit for three successive seasons and is one of the most popular speakers in the far west.

farm, according to A. P. Yorkes, writing for the office of farm management of the department of agriculture. He sees great possibilities of economy in the tractor.

Eighteen months ago the tractor was a comparatively large and expensive outfit with not place, perhaps, in the operation of the medium sized farm. Now, however, the type of tractor most in demand by the farmer is a small, low-priced outfit, capable of pulling from two to four plow bottoms and with belt capacity sufficient to operate any of the machines commonly used on the average farm.

These small tractors are of simpler construction than the large ones. Most of them have only one drive wheel and usually only one speed forward and one reverse, thus eliminating considerable gearing, including the differential gears. At the same time they permit the hitching of a two-bottom gang plow directly behind the center of draft of the machine, something which was impossible to accomplish with a wide tractor having two drive wheels without causing side drafts or running the tractor partly on the plowed land.
