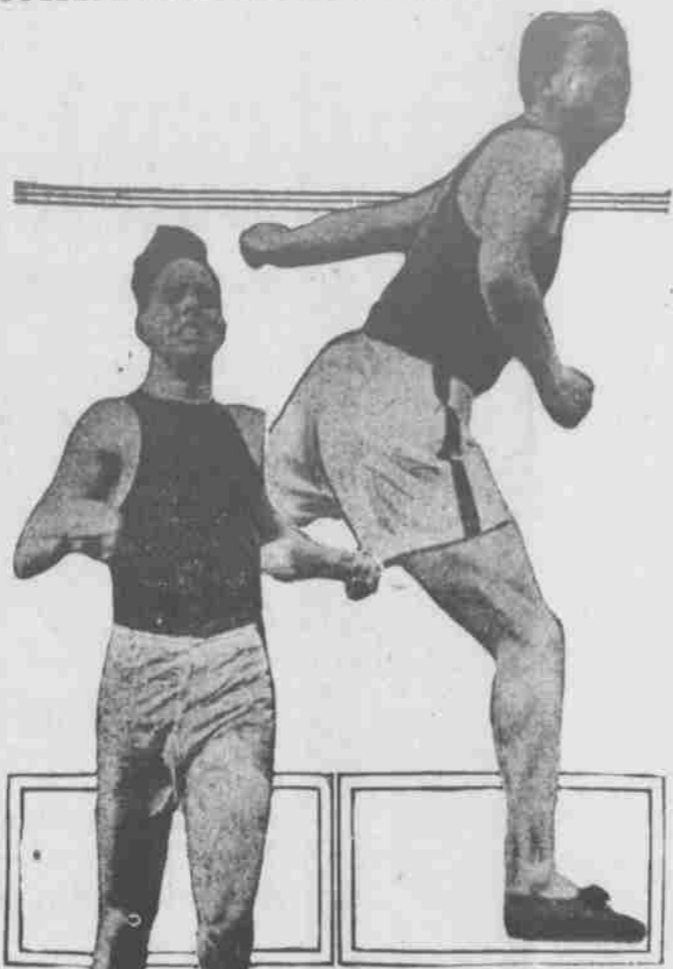

Ted Meredith Finishing in One Mile Relay.

Meredith made himself a hero with the Pennsylvania student body by running off the last quarter mile of the one mile relay championship in the smashing time of 48.25 seconds, thereby bringing the interscholastic championship and a new world record of 2:18 to the Quaker college. The Olympic half mile flier started on practically even terms with Bill Bingham of Harvard, and after a terrific duel of speed and strength, beat the Crimson's fastest middle distance runner by six yards. HERMISTON DWELLING SERIOUSLY DAMAGED BY FLAMES; INSURED

HOME OF EARL CARSON SUFFERS FROM BLAZE WHICH STARTS FROM FLUE.

Side Walls and Roof Are Burned—Losses on Furniture Amounts to Over \$100 While Building Is Damaged to Extent of More Than \$700 Other News of Hermiston.

HERMISTON, Ore., June 22.—The residence of Earl Carson on Main street near Fourth street caught fire early Saturday morning from an overheated flue burning the side walls and entire roof. Losses on the furniture and house were fully covered by insurance, the furniture for \$450 and the building for \$750.

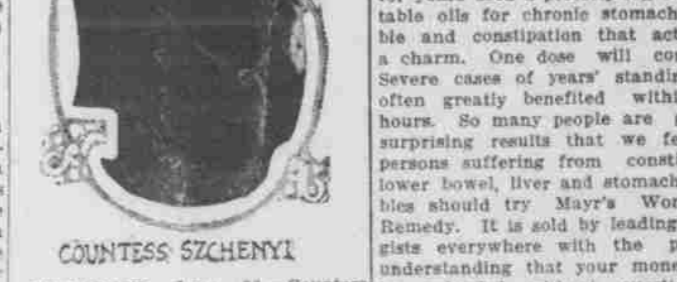

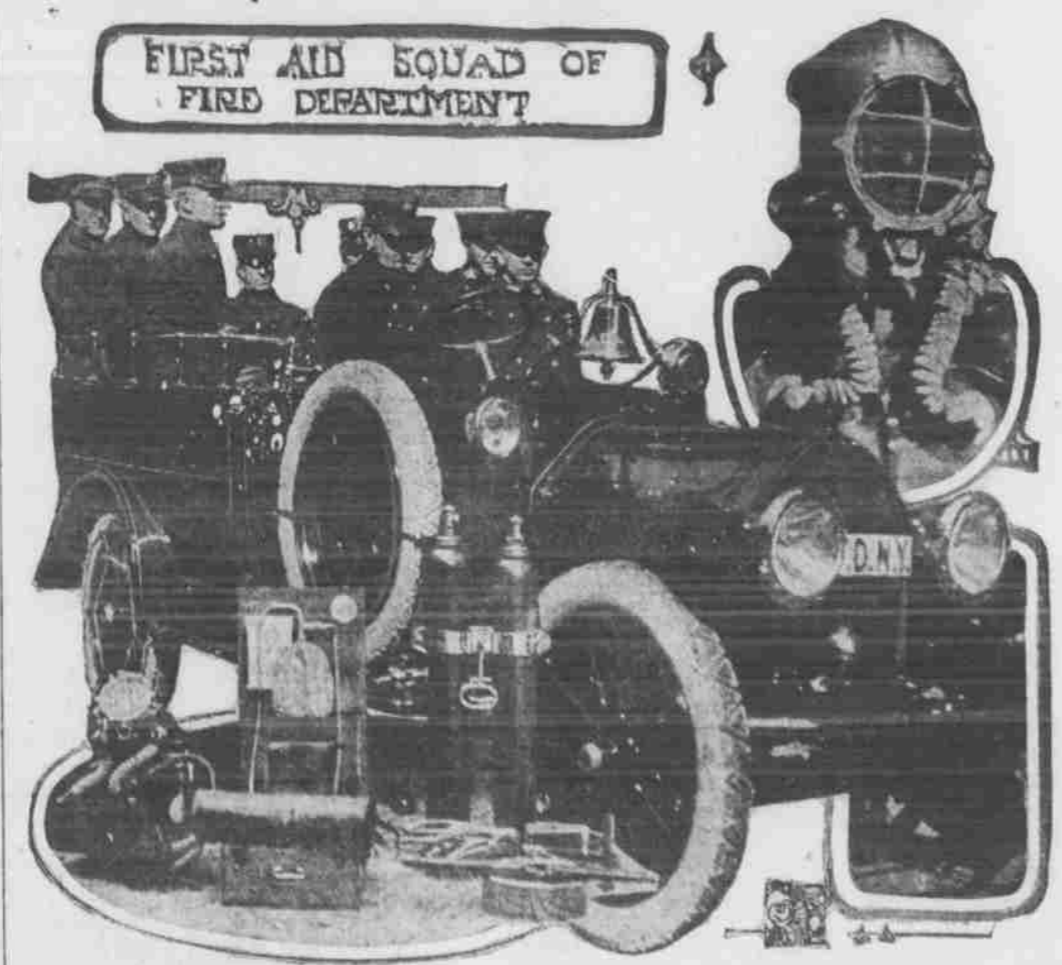
