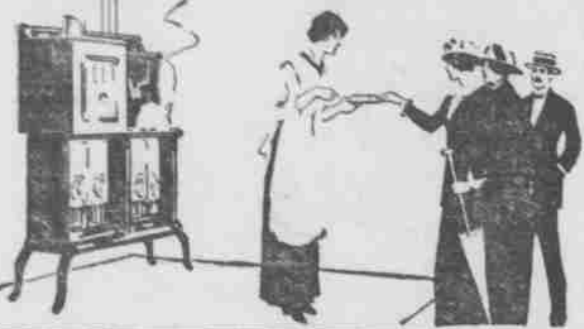

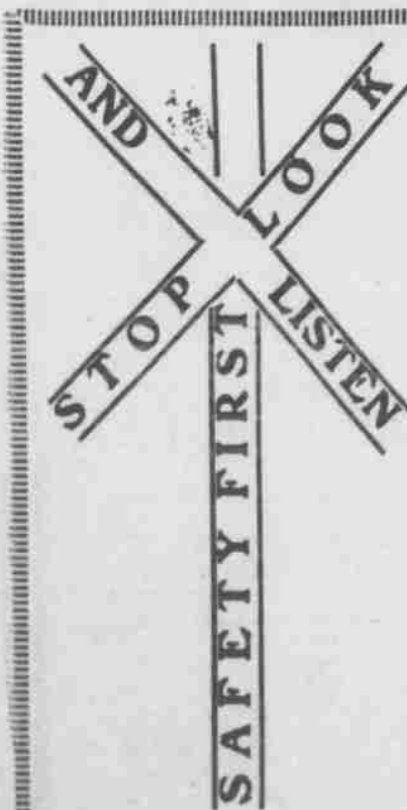

PILOT ROCK FINISHES SEASON WITHOUT ONCE HAVING LOST A GAME

WONDERFUL RECORD MAINTAINED TO LAST BY BLUE MOUNTAIN LEAGUE TEAM.

Double Header Yesterday Ends in Victory—First Game With Hermiston is Pretty Battle — Tallenders Play Snappy Game But Darling Proves Too Difficult to Solve.

PILOT ROCK, Ore., June 28.—By poking out a clean single in the last of the ninth with the score tied up 2 to 2, Pitcher Darling was able to complete his wonderful record of pitching his team to a straight string of victories from the first scheduled game until the last. Just by way of adding one more victory, he pitched the second game of the afternoon against Umatilla and won handily, 8 to 1.

The Pilot Rock-Hermiston game, the final of the Blue Mountain season, proved also to be one of the best. The tallenders brought a snappy team and with Merle Phelps in the box, looked like the best aggregation the Pebbles have met this year. Before, however, he was settled down, the home team had taken an advantage, chasing two runs across in the first after two were out. Gilbert singled and Pickett was safe on an error. Both came home on Albrecht's double.

Then the beautiful pitching duel began. Blank followed blank until the fifth when Blakely of Hermiston eluded the globe far over the centerfielder's head, an easy homer. The ninth came with Pilot Rock one run to the good and the westenders tied it up when Jones hit for three bases and registered on a wild pitch. Manager Smith of the Pebbles ran in two pinch hitters in the last of the ninth. Hayes went in for Rankin and responded with a single. Moss, batting for Westgate, struck out but Darling whanged out a safety, scoring Hayes who had reached second on a passed ball.

The Umatilla boys, reinforced by a few Hermiston players, took the field immediately and a seven inning contest began. E. Spinning, a youngster, pitched for the seaport team and worked in a very creditable way. His support was not of the best and his teammates couldn't hit behind him. Darling whiffing 13 of them.

The Hermiston and Umatilla team chartered the motor for the day and brought along a big crowd of fans who vied with the home squad in the rooting.
