HUSTONIA'S NOVEL FARMER COMMUNITY TO ORDER IN OHIO

VILLAGE CONSTRUCTED ALONG PLAN TO AFFORD BOTH PLAY AND WORK.

Designed by Foster Houston and Is Partnership Farm Is Operated on Card-Index System.

SOUTH CHARLESTOWN, O., July 2.—A few miles from this town lies Hustonia, the only built to order community center for farmers in the United States. It was built under the direction of Foster Houston, aged 47, and is designed to bring the neighborhood idea to the country, so that rural residents may have healthy amusement during leisure hours, and so that the young tillers of the soil shall not weaken in any desire to flock to the big cities.

Houston himself deserves a paragraph. He began life as a boy bound out to a skintilt farmer who allowed him ten cents a week spending money and gave him an orange for Christmas. He worked from 3 a. m. until darkness. He learned all about farming as it was done before scientists took hold of it. When he inherited a bank and several thousand acres of land on the death of two elder brothers, then he began to widen his knowledge of scientific farming.

Three years ago began to put his ideas on farming into operation. Owing 10,000 acres of good soil in Madison, Clark and Green counties, he divided his land into 32 farms, and instituted the tenant system, with this important provision—the tenant was his business partner. Each farm was operated as a separate business, as Houston and Jones or Houston and Smith, or Houston and Houston happens in the case of his son, who operates a 600 acre plot. Each tenant is supreme on his own farm, answerable only to Houston.

Each of the partnership farms is operated on a card-index, scientific, business-like system. All disbursements are by check; every animal and curycumb on every farm is listed and a monthly audit is made of each partnership. Every field at every month of the year is accounted for with colored maps. Expert accountants keep the books. An expert engineer has charge of the buildings erected, roads constructed and general layout of the farms. Each of the 32 farms produce different crops and stock, the latter numbering into the thousands. Two farms specialize in dairying, another in chicken raising, another in horses, etc. The dairies are modern, so far as labor saving machinery and modern methods of handling milk are concerned. Orchards are carefully kept, houses and buildings well painted, and everything conducted on a business-like basis. All of the farms are beautiful to look upon.

Hustonia comprises 230 buildings. The one which Houston takes most pride in is the Hustonia Athletic Club House, a structure 40 by 70 feet. This place has become the veritable center of the social life of the community, in addition to being the home of baseball and other teams, all made up of men and boys who live on the farms.

"We have had better corn, better roads," said Houston, "but it is high time that we had better people—more contented, more enlightened, more educated. I regard this movement as one of the most important of the period."

Houston argues that farmers' boys leave the country, not to escape work, but to seek entertainment. He has plans for lectures, motion pictures and other educational and social activities to be held in the club house. Between the tenants and Houston there is no end of good fellowship.

Houston declares that his tenants—business partners—are not leaving his farms to get land of their own. This is because their efforts, backed by the money of the Houston farm company, brings them gains they could not hope to make on their own farms.
