CHICAGO WHEAT KEEPS STEADY

(Thursday's Market.) CHICAGO.—The volume of business in the pit was slight. Wheat prices started with an advance of 1-4c, while corn was up 1-8@1-2c at the outset. Oats opened 1-8@3-8c higher.

Commission houses bought July and September wheat. Selling was by pri-

ate wire houses. Crop reports today were better.

Early in the trading there was a general advance in all grains. Wheat jumped more than 1c on the advance. On the advance the market for wheat was found to be bare of offerings. Buying in the corn trade was in a small way. Trade in oats was light and without features. Provisions were down at the outset of the trading.

(Thursday's Market.) PORTLAND, Ore.—Maintaining a firm tone throughout the day with little actual sale being reported the wheat market passed an uneventful day.

Chartering was the only feature the fixtures reported in the past 24 hours, being the French bark Pierre Antoinette now on the other side and which is to return to this coast for a second load for M. H. Houser, and the Russian bark Fabwohl for the same exporter.

Oats also remained stiff during the day.

Fire Sweeps 10 Acres.

ALBANY, Ore., July 1.—Two hundred cords of wood were destroyed in a fire which ran over 10 acres of timber on the farm of William Scrfeling, on the South Santiam river, between Thomas and Crabtree. The fire endangered about 200 acres of timber and an additional 600 cords of wood. About 50 fire fighters summoned from the surrounding country stopped it.

Milwaukie Gas to Be \$1.

MILWAUKIE, Ore., July 2.—It was announced here that Milwaukie people will pay the Portland rate for gas, \$1, for each 1000 cubic feet, from the installation of the gas mains. A canvass

of three days for gas consumers resulted in obtaining more than 100 families, and under the terms of the franchise the Portland Gas & Coke company provides gas at Portland rates, with a 50-cent minimum rate. Bull Run water will be turned in

the new mains laid by the city and Streib's addition will be the first to get this water. A special election will be called in the near future to provide additional bond sales to complete the distribution system.
