ALLEGED FORGER PAROLED BY CIRCUIT JUDGE PHELPS

P. L. RAWN HELD TO BE MENTALLY IRRESPONSIBLE FOR HIS ACT.

Accepting competent testimony to the effect that the man is mentally irresponsible, Circuit Judge G. W. Phelps today paroled P. L. Rawn, the man who forged the name of Ben Colvin to a \$500 note and who engaged a plea of guilty to the charge of forgery. Whether or not the man will be committed to an institution or will be placed in the custody of some private individual Judge Phelps has not yet decided.

Rawn's family who live in Tennessee, recently sent an attorney here who represented to the court that Rawn has been mentally irresponsible for some time. Judge Phelps secured Dr. A. E. Tamsie of the Eastern Oregon State Hospital to make an examination of the man. The doctor has just reported that his examination convinces him that Rawn was not mentally responsible for his criminal act.

Rawn came here first early in the spring and gave out that he was representing a big firm of capitalists in Boise. He announced he would build a modern apartment house and made preliminary negotiations for the sale of Colvin's big stock ranch in Grant county for \$150,000. Later he went to Portland and lived at the Multnomah hotel in style. It was while there that he forged the note and sent it to the American National bank of this city, asking that the bank purchase it. The bank was suspicious and reported the matter to the officers with the result that Rawn was arrested.

CITY OF CONVICTS IN HEART OF MOUNTAINS

PARKDALE PRISON CAMP, Cyo., July 9.—Here in the heart of one of Colorado's ruggedest mountain districts is probably the most remarkable municipality in the world.

Seventy-five convicts, including fifty-three burglars and robbers, have a government job, for and by themselves.

Only once since the camp was established two and a half years ago to work on what will be the most beautiful scenic highway in the world, has there been a violation of any law within the camp's borders.

This consisted of the theft of a package of tobacco. It was a heinous offense and was punished by the greatest punishment possible—the theft was returned to the penitentiary, deprived of outdoor employment and rendered an outcast in the eyes of fellow prisoners.

The day and night marshals in the camp have nothing to do; their offices are merely honorary.

Elections are honestly conducted but arouse great excitement. Notices of primaries are duly protested. The polls are conducted in regular fashion and the successful candidates are ushered into the offices with much formality.

A saloon keeper serving for life for murder was recently elected mayor on the prohibition ticket. He made a political bargain with the socialists and won.

Treatless and these are written by the more learned members of the camp and discussed at "town meetings." Principles of good government are favorite topics for debates. Periodically social occasions are conducted inside the big tent which is known as "city hall." The programs consist of recitations, music, vaudeville and other forms of entertainment. The camp has a phonograph and 150 good records.

There is a board to pass ordinances and arbitrate disputes. It drafted a constitution. Only twice has it been called upon to settle disagreements.

OPERA STARS FOUND WITHOUT TEMPERAMENT

CHICAGO, July 9.—Found: A classification of stars minus temperament. Imagine a grand opera star who gets \$4000 an hour every public performance being without that well known temperament; imagine a \$15,000 a year left handed pitcher without temperament; imagine a Paderewski, or a Caruso or a Mary Garden or a great actor or actress without temperament; it can't be imagined. Even some of the Vernon Castles and Mrs. Vernon Castles are afflicted with it. It's a part and parcel of the business of being a star to have a temperament.

But the seeming impossibility has been located right here in Chicago. The stars under consideration get anywhere from \$100 to \$20,000 for a single public performance and they not only as a class never have temperament, but they can't afford to have it. They are automobile speed demons.

Chicago recently saw as great a galaxy of auto speed drivers as ever competed in this country, when the new Chicago Speedway was baptized with one of the greatest speed contests since Old Dobbin was chased to the bench by gasoline buggies. During the two weeks that the speed kings were flitting with death in preparation for the big race Chicago saw a great deal of the speed stars. Not one of them showed signs of temperament. They all said they hadn't time to see the work they put in on their machines for from 8 to 10 hours daily, in order to have them fit for a comparatively short turn about the track, they didn't have.

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INQUEST SHOWS THAT HOLT TOOK OWN LIFE IN JAIL

INVESTIGATION WILL BE CONTINUED INTO DEATH OF MORGAN'S ASSAULT.

MINEOLA, July 9.—Following a brief session at the inquest into the death of Frank Holt, Coroner Jones intimated that he will find the culprit bomber planter and the assailant of Morgan suicided unaided and without complicity from the outside. Jerry O'Ryan, an aged guard who was on duty when Holt ended his life, testified he was now satisfied the "explosion" he heard and which he thought at first was a shot, was really the popping of Holt's skull as he struck the stone flagging. C. S. Cornell, an undertaker, testified the wound was not caused by a bullet. The inquest adjourned for a week after this testimony was taken.
