MUNICH, Bavaria, July 13.—An epistle sent by Pope Benedict to Cardinal Francis von Bettinger, the Archbishop of Munich, and to the Bavarian bishops was published in the diocesan papers. The pontiff prays that "God may grant that the evils of this bitter war may take a turn for the better."

The pope cherishes the hope that God will be "moved through the joint prayers of the faithful to fulfill the fervent plea of all, and that he will grant the blessings of a coveted-for peace under which Europe's troubled people may long prosper."

Judge Frank R. Willis took under advisement this application to reopen a previously denied motion to quash the indictments.

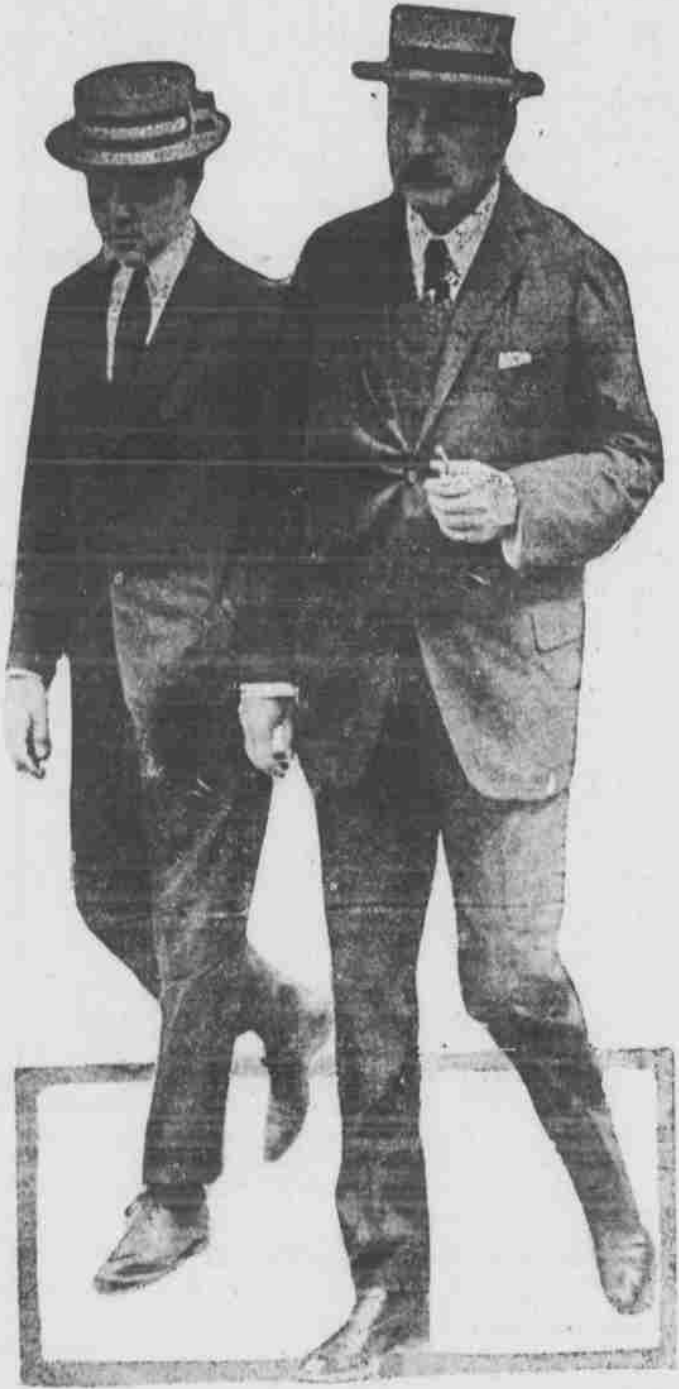
Ancestors Make Romance. CHICAGO July 14.—When two people have ancestors—long, unbroken lines of them for centuries—romance is not far away. This was the explanation of the unexpected marriage of Miss Madge A. O'Malley, of 838 Dole avenue to Charles H. Bagley in California a few days ago.

Ira O'Malley, president of the Automatic Water & Heating Appliances Company, at 79 West Lake street, first learned of his sister's wedding by a press dispatch, how Charles H. Bagley, a reputed millionaire of Eureka, N. M., had led Miss Madge A. O'Malley before Justice Cox in Santa Ana, the Greta Green of Los Angeles. The civil ceremony was followed by the Catholic service.

"I have received no other announcement of the wedding," said Mr. O'Malley. "She has been traveling on the coast for the past two years. She had met him in Paris 10 or 12 years ago. He was born on the Isle of St. Helena, where his father was one of the guards over Napoleon and later Surveyor-General of England; it was said. He wrote history. My sister began searching in dusty tomes for historical subjects. She sent him much data she gathered from time to time in the libraries here.

"Then she became interested in ancestors. She traced the O'Malley lineage back to the year 175 A. D. in Ireland. She dug up all the ancestors in the family in an unbroken line back to 779 A. D. So ancestors brought about the romance."
