Advertising Pioneer Dies.

ST. HELENA, Cal., July 20.—Mrs. Ellen G. White, one of the founders of the Seventh Day Adventists, died here aged 88. She was widely known among the members of that denomination throughout the United States, and by many she was regarded as a prophetess.

On February 13 this year Mrs. White met with a serious accident near her home here, due to a fall which broke the bone in her left thigh. She is survived by two sons, James Edson White, of Marshall, Mich., and William C. White.

Militia Gets Aircraft.

NEW YORK, July 20.—The Aero Club of America announced that the states of New York and Vermont have accepted offers of aeroplanes and the services of aviators during the maneuvers of the national guards of those states. The offers were made by the Aero Club.

It was announced that Ralph McMillan, of Omaha, has offered his biplane for the use of the Nebraska national guard.

Adjutant General Thomas L. Stewart of the Pennsylvania national guard has notified the Aero Club that its offer of the use of three aeroplanes and pilots for the annual maneuvers in that state will not be accepted "because it would not be convenient to have an airplane in camp."

Boy at Play is Kidnaped.

NORTH YAKIMA, July 20.—While playing on West Yakima avenue near the Hotel Davis, where his mother is employed, the 11-year-old son of Mrs. Myrtle Gum was kidnaped by a man who drove up in an automobile and got away with the boy after a struggle with Mrs. Bowman, proprietress of the hotel.

Mrs. Gum says the abductor was her husband, Marion Gum, a printer, who left her and the boy last winter and went to Stockton, Cal. It is said that Gum recently declared his intention to take the boy.

\$20,000 Is Left College.

LANCASTER, Pa., July 20.—Dr. H. H. Appel, president of Franklin and Marshall college, has been notified that under the will of Dr. Eugene T. Santee of Philadelphia, who died recently, the college will receive \$20,000 and the Lancaster Reformed Theological Seminary, a sister institution \$10,000.

Dr. Santee was a trustee of the seminary, and his father, the late Charles Santee, of Philadelphia, was for many years a trustee of the seminary and college.

NEWS FROM THE FARM AND RANGE

Has Big Honey Crop—T. J. Barringer reports that his bees are making the best showing he has seen in a great while and that his crop of honey this year will be big, says the Stanfield Standard. The season started slowly owing to the cold rains in the early spring but the fine weather of the last month or so has allowed the bees to load the hives rapidly. He is also living on an average of three or four new stands a day and thinks his increase will reach 100 per cent easily for the season.

Second Crop Is Large—The farmers on the project on the Meadows are busy cutting their second crop of alfalfa and are making good progress in spite of the fact that there is a shortage of labor here at this time. Most of the available labor of the community has gone to the wheat fields during the harvest season and will be away for a month or two yet. By working on a cooperative basis, however, the growers are able to make good headway. This cutting is exceptionally heavy and will more than make up for the shortage in the first cutting, which was caused by the cold rains in the early spring months.—Stanfield Standard.

Secured a Good Yield—Officer Alex Manning has returned from his farm near Pilot Rock where he has been for a week assisting in harvesting. The cutting of the grain was finished this morning. The wheat went 25 bushels to the acre and was good milling wheat. Mr. Manning states, and off a 100-acre field of barley he secured 1800 sacks, about 27 1/2 bushels to the acre.

Nine Cattle Worth \$10,000—Nine head of fine Hereford cattle from Norway, Iowa, purchased by George Chandler, arrived in Baker yesterday and were taken out to the Chandler ranch today. The actual cost of the stock was \$10,000. Three of the animals are bulls, and six are heifers. Of the first class, one will tip the beam at 2400 pounds. Mr. Chandler will send three of the new arrivals to the fair at Yakima and Spokane and to the San Francisco exposition to enter the stock shows.—Baker Herald.

Carl Starts Cutting—Frank Carl, prominent reservation farmer, today started his combine. He is cutting the quarter section which was damaged most by the recent winds and estimates that he will get about 28 bushels to the acre.

Wheat Ripening Fast—The hot weather of yesterday and today is proving very acceptable to the farmers as it tends to finish the ripening of the wheat. Within a few days practically all of the farmers save those in the foothills, will be harvesting.

Austria Regulates Price.

ZURICH, July 20.—The Austrian government has fixed the following prices of grain until the harvest of 1915 per 220 pounds. Wheat, 34 crowns (a crown is 24 1-2 cents); rye and malting barley, 28 crowns; other barley and oats, 28 crowns.

These prices are midway between the war and the normal anti-war prices. The government also promises shortly to permit of pure wheat flour and rye meal.

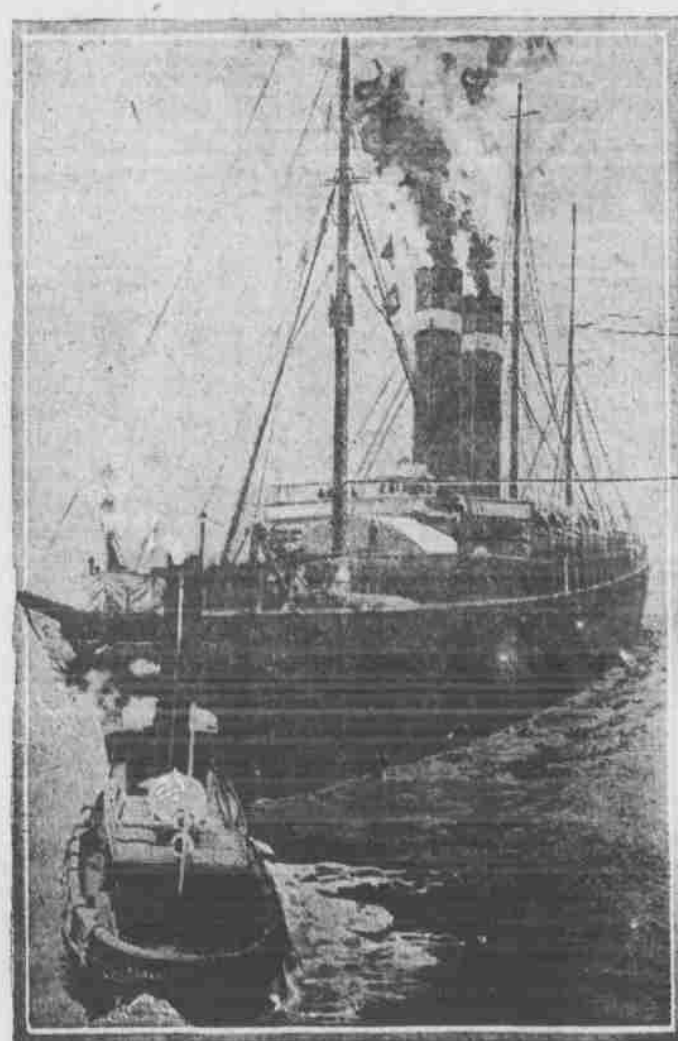
