Governor Refuses to Issue Papers.
Attorney D. W. Bailey this morning received a telegram from Governor Withycombe announcing that he had decided to refuse to issue the requisition papers for Warren W. Smart, held in the local jail and wanted in Walla Walla on a charge of abandonment of a child. Mr. Bailey made a showing to the governor yesterday and it was upon this showing that the governor has made his decision. Mr. Bailey showed that Mr. Smart was not a fugitive from justice but has been working upon the Stubblefield ranch in the east end of the county for some months and made no effort to conceal his whereabouts. He also showed that he had been arrested for contempt of court and tried in the Walla Walla court last May for alleged refusal to fulfill the terms of a decree of divorce given his wife. He was acquitted in

that court and, Mr. Bailey contended, has now been arrested upon the same charge and would be tried in the same court if returned. The refusal of the governor to issue the papers will result in the liberation of the defendant.

On a charge of assaulting and beating his wife, Alfred L. Sherman, a local carpenter, was arrested last night and this morning entered a plea of guilty in the justice court. Sentence will be passed upon him in the morning.

Little Child is Injured.
News was received here today of an injury to the little three year old child of Mr. and Mrs. Brady Howdyshell yesterday afternoon. According to the report, the little one was playing near the threshing and fell against a chute in such manner as to make a gash near her eye. It was necessary for several stitches to be taken by Dr. Ringo who attended the child.

Hottest Day and Hottest Night.
Today is the hottest day of the summer so far and last night was the hottest night, according to the official records. This afternoon just before 3 o'clock the mercury reached 104, three degrees higher than it went yesterday. Last night the minimum temperature recorded was 64 which is three degrees higher than the minimum for the season heretofore.

Searching for Her Husband.
Does anyone know the whereabouts of George Earle McClure, familiarly known as "Shorty" McClure? His wife, living in Centralia, Wn., is very much distressed over his disappearance and is writing to local people in the hopes of learning something of him. Says Allies Must Take Dardanelles By August 1 Or Never

VIENNA, July 21.—Unless the Dardanelles are forced this month the allies will never reach Constantinople, M. Rianow, a Bulgarian diplomat is quoted as stating in an interview printed in the Neue Journal. "By August Turkey will be equipped with munitions. Her position will be impregnable," he declared. Rianow said that talk of a Balkan federation is nonsense because a union of Serbia and Bulgaria is impossible.

WAS GERMAN AMBASSADOR RECALLED FOR HELPING BRYAN IN 1900 RACE?

WASHINGTON, July 21.—"Probably correct," was Assistant Secretary of State Adee's comment on a story circulated here that Ambassador Von Holleben, of Germany, was recalled in 1903 because he favored Bryan's anti-imperialistic demands in the presidential campaign of 1900. During the same campaign the story goes Von Holleben actively opposed the re-election of McKinley, hoping in the president's defeat to gain for Germany a coaling station in the Caribbean sea.

BANDIT HOLDS SHEEPMAN FOR RANSOM IN IDAHO

SHERIFF WITH POSSE OF COWBOYS SEARCHING COUNTRY FOR MAN AND VICTIM.


IDAHO FALLS, July 21.—The entire community is aroused over the abduction and holding for ransom of E. A. Empey, a wealthy cattle and sheepman, by an armed bandit Saturday night in the mountainous country near the Wyoming line. The bandit sent word to relatives by Empey's son he will be killed Saturday if a ransom of six thousand dollars is not paid. Hundreds of determined men are volunteering to search for the endangered man but only cowboys familiar with the country are chosen by the sheriff.

Ten armed cowboys made a thorough search of Sheep mountain in which direction the abductor took his captive, without result. Blood hounds from Salt Lake have been put on the trail. Relatives are distressed. The bandit threatened relatives if they told the authorities of the abduction or the ransom demand. Poses of cowboys will search all the country between here and Wyoming.

LANSING IS STILL AT WORK ON NEW NOTE

REPLY REASSERTING AMERICAN RIGHTS WILL PROBABLY GO TO BERLIN, SATURDAY.

WASHINGTON, July 21.—Secretary Lansing is engaged in putting the American note to Germany in the final language in which the country's views on submarine warfare will be reiterated. The note will probably be forwarded to Germany Saturday after the finished product has been submitted to the cabinet Friday.

It is not likely the note will refer to the attack upon the Ordona by a submarine on the last voyage. This is due to the fact it will be impossible

for the state or treasury departments to complete an investigation of the stories told by passengers of the vessel.

Girl Accuses Minister.
PRINCETON, Ind., July 21.—Rev. John A. Persinger, pastor of the First Christian church at Owensville, was arrested recently on a charge made by Miss Dale Gardner, 18, who has been secretary of the Sunday school of that church.

The minister is a young man of family. He pleaded not guilty in court here and gave \$500 bond for his appearance for trial.

MADISON STREET WILL BE IN PAVING DISTRICT

MAJORITY OF PROPERTY OWNERS PREPARE PETITION TO COUNCIL.

A petition asking the council to pave Madison from Jackson to Wilson has been circulated during the past few days and will be presented to the council this evening. It is understood that 80 per cent of the property affected is represented on the petition and that a number of other property owners have agreed to sign either a petition or a remonstrance.

A week ago a petition was presented asking for the paving of Main from Jackson to Wilson, Wilson from Main to Matlock and Matlock from Wilson to Raley. This petition will probably be acted upon tonight and it is likely that Madison street will be included in the district.
