### ARCHITECTS DREW FIVE PLANS FOR HENRY FORD'S NEW HOME

Then They Were Fired, Their Lawyer Declares in Hearing of Suit Against Manufacturer.

DETROIT, Mich., July 22.—Numerous differences that have arisen over the construction of Henry Ford's new \$300,000 home at Dearborn were aired today when testimony was taken before Master William Sayer in the federal court, in the suit of Von Holst & Fyfe, architects, who are suing Ford for \$44,002.75, following their discharge from the work.

He said the total cost was to have been \$282,000, and with \$72,000 as the charge for sawing stone and the cost of the rough material, the preparation alone would have cost \$100,000.

Od Plenty, Salt Scarce. ST. JOHNS, N. F., July 21.—A scarcity of salt threatens to offset to a large extent the benefits to be derived by Newfoundland fishermen from the unusually large catch of cod along the northern and eastern coasts and on the Grand Banks this summer. The war has caused delays to steamers bringing the salt.

### SOCIAL HYGIENE IS TOPIC AT HERMISTON AND GOVERNMENT CAMP

This evening there will be a meeting for the men when addresses will be made by W. D. McNary, M. D., superintendent of the Eastern Oregon State Hospital at Pendleton, Rev. Snyder of Pendleton and J. T. Hinkle.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 22.—Alcohol and the part it plays in the vice and crime question in big cities was the principal topic at today's address at the Ninth International Purity Congress, now in session here.

Miss Edith McWilla, an editor of the Scientific Temperance Journal, Boston, Mass., spoke on "Alcohol and the Child's Birthright," while Dr. Guy W. Wadsworth, of Los Angeles, talked on the state wide campaign now being waged to make California dry. Eleven other speakers made addresses along similar lines. The convention ends Saturday.

VANCOUVER, Wash., July 22.—Acting as his own attorney, being a graduate of the Michigan Law school at Ann Arbor, Ed Fulton has brought suit in the justice of the peace court against Herman Heberle to collect \$225, part payment on four sacks of seed potatoes. ### STATEMENT SHOWS ORE. BANKS IN GOOD SHAPE

SALEM, Ore., July 22.—That the uncertain financial feeling has been more or less removed in this state is indicated by the statement of State Bank Superintendent Sargent, issued tonight of the banks in Oregon at the close of business June 22.

The loans show a decrease of about \$1,000,000 since the statement of June 30, 1914, but they have increased approximately \$500,000 during the past two months. Investments in bonds and other securities also have increased about \$750,000 during the same period. A large part of these increases is due to the demand on the banks for harvesting crops, but Mr. Sargent is confident there is a tendency on the part of the banks to extend new lines of credit to legitimate enterprises.

The overdrafts at date of this call show a decrease of \$173,127.12, or nearly 50 per cent, compared with the call for a year ago.

The real estate holdings of the banks have been increased nearly \$1,000,000 during the past year.

While there has been a decrease of more than \$2,500,000 in balances due from other banks, the statement shows an increase of about \$900,000 over the statement of June 30, 1914. There has been practically no change in the demand deposits and amounts due to

other banks during the past two months, there being a decrease of nearly \$9,000,000 for the year, while the time and savings deposits have increased approximately \$2,000,000.

The report shows that the National banks, as yet, have not taken advantage of their readjustment privileges with the Federal Reserve Bank to any great extent, the total amount from the state at date of call being only \$102,982.82, while the total redemptions and bills payable of all the banks amount to \$2,282,127.34, an increase of \$1,536,914.79 over the statement of last year.

As usual, the statement shows a good percentage of cash reserves and a whole reveals a very satisfactory condition throughout the state.

### Citizens Cut Railroad.

BELLFONTAINE, O., July 22.—Citizens of La Rue, frightened when the Scioto river overflowed its banks, cut a hole through the big Four railway embankment to let the water escape. The Big Four agent, W. J. Schlugel, and Detective John Kernan tried to prevent interference with the company's property.

The agent was pitched into the water and the detective placed in jail. The track was so badly damaged by the escaping flood that all trains are being detained.

### Holt's Death Described.

MINEOLA, L. I., July 22.—The inquest into the death of Frank Holt, assailant of J. P. Morgan, who committed suicide in the jail here was resumed. Three prisoners testified that Holt climbed to the top of the cell tier and threw himself to the floor.
