OREGON BUILDING IS CENTER OF ACTION DURING THE WEEK

SOCIAL FUNCTION IN HONOR OF O. A. C. GIRLS PROVES BRILLIANT EVENT.

Band from Battleship Oregon furnished music; Famous \$15,000 silver service from Fighting Ship brought into use; "All Oregon Week."

SAN FRANCISCO, Calif., July 28.—(Special.)—The Oregon building is the center for much special activity these days. The United Artists held their convention at the building on Monday and the Salem drill team, which won out in the big drill contest, created quite a furor. There was an all-day program and the Artisans were fed on the building's vast expanse of balconies. Then came the Panama-Pacific Historical Congress for a session at the theater in this building. Prof. Joseph Schafer, of the state university, presided and read a paper on "The Western Ocean as a Determinant in Oregon History." Friday night one of the largest formal social functions of the exposition was given in honor of the young women of the Oregon Agricultural College here serving in the domestic science demonstration kitchen and dining room, and in honor of the college and university young men here as guides. The invitation list included the highest exposition officials, officialdom at the various state buildings, the elite of the society of the Bay cities, and the sojourning friends of these young people. Hundreds of these came to do the young people honor and large numbers stayed to enjoy the dancing. The domestic science women were congratulated warmly on the success of their undertaking and the expressions came from the innermost depths, for the Oregon building's dining room is the fad with the greatest of the great. The band from the battleship Oregon furnished music for the occasion and as a most distinguished honor, the Oregon's \$15,000 punch bowl and service was loaned. This splendid social function was the happy thought of Commissioner John F. Logan, who desired to show in the world Oregon's appreciation of the young women of the state in their successful endeavor to gain home service, and of the young men in preparing practically for usefulness. And other functions are to follow swiftly. On the 25th fifteen hundred gallons of loganberry juice will tell at least fifteen thousand people of a new nectar more glorious than that which Jupiter sips. There will be an all-day program. August 9th to 17th will be "All Oregon Week" each day a special day and probably with a function each night. The 17th is "Benson Day" and this will be made one of the greatest days of the exposition, this being an exposition as well as an Oregon occasion. Elaborate plans are under way.

NAVAL PLANS NOW RECEIVING CLOSE STUDY BY DANIELS

QUESTION OF NEW SHIPS FOR FLEET PROVES COMPLICATED PROBLEM.

As Many as Half Dozen New Dreadnaughts Suggested—Can Battleships Be Made Submarine Proof?—Reports Being Received from European War.

WASHINGTON, July 28.—Two, three, four or a half dozen battleships? This is the question being threshed out by Secretary of the Navy Daniels and two score of aides, here and abroad. Daniels, the general board and other officials are today busily working on the naval building program to be recommended to congress next December. They have three months to decide the question of how many new dreadnaughts Uncle Sam shall order built next year. It promises to be one of the most debated questions before the new congress.

On Secretary Daniels' desk today are stacks of documents, masses of statistics and innumerable reports of foreign and U. S. naval officials, bulging on the battleship building program.

Every effort to keep secret the final decision reached will be made. Formal announcement will not be made until after the navy estimates have been submitted to President Wilson in October. It is probable that they will not be announced then, being deferred until presented to congress.

There are indications at present of a most determined effort to have Secretary Daniels and the general board, the strategy experts, at whose head is Admiral Dewey, agree unanimously on a building program. The administration wishes to go to congress united on recommendations for appropriations to increase the navy.

Last year the general board recommended construction of four battleships—dreadnaughts. Because of the treasury's condition, Daniels stood out for only two.

Financial conditions will play a great part in congress' action, as well as that of the department regarding proposed new dreadnaughts. The department also is prepared for the opposition of the Little Navy contingent in congress as a result of the tremendous destruction to battleships wrought by submarines in the European war.

So far all naval experts are convinced that the submarine development has not put the big battleships into the discard as engines of destruction. Secretary Daniels recently said dreadnaughts are still the backbone of the navy. With proper auxiliaries and submarine defensive flotillas, navy experts insist that the bulwark of the navy is yet the big ship.

It is regarded certain that at least two new battleships will be urged for construction by Secretary Daniels. With the popular agitation on the "preparedness question," and his certain discussion at length in congress, many observers of things maritime here believe the two-new-ships program will be enlarged this year. A vigorous fight is also certain from those opposing militarism, and one of the most exciting combats of the year on the navy building program is now considered a foregone conclusion.

In the process of preparing his estimates, Secretary Daniels is receiving reports from naval attaches at American embassies and legations abroad, and also a corps of naval officials assigned as observers among the European belligerents. The efficiency of the dreadnaught versus the submarine, mines and smaller vessels is the subject of highly scientific illumination.

Means to immunize the larger vessels from the thrusts of the under-seas craft are also being studied by the naval experts. Secretary Daniels is optimistic that Yankee genius may solve the question of curbing the submarine and extend the already enormous fighting power of the dreadnaught. It is believed, however, that if some method coping successfully with the submarine is found by the United States navy it will be kept secret except in the most confidential quarters.

Trawler Is Torpedoed.

ABERDEEN, July 27.—The British trawler Gadwell has been torpedoed in the North sea by a German submarine. The members of the crew were landed at Strom.

MIRROR AT HILL CURVE TO WARN AUTOIST OF DANGER

PITTSBURG, Pa., July 28.—Flashing a clear reflection of one of the most dangerous curves in western Pennsylvania, a plate glass mirror, 20 by 48 inches, has been placed at the top of the Logan's Ferry Hill by the New Kensington Automobile Club, near here.

The mirror is firmly set in a heavy wooden frame, and is mounted so that automobile drivers may see the curve they are approaching for a distance of fully 400 feet, thus giving them ample warning of an approaching car.

Drivers say the reflection of headlights at night make the mirror of even greater value than during the daytime.
