#### Prof. Landers Returns

#### Civil Service Exams

The U. S. civil service commission announces that a forest and field clerk examination will be held in this city on September 19, 1915, to fill vacancies as they may occur in the forest and reclamation services. The usual entrance salary is from \$1100 to \$1200 per annum. It is possible that vacancies may also be filled from this examination at \$900 and \$1000 per annum. Applications will not be accepted from persons who do not show that they have had at least one year's actual experience in clerical work in a business office. A knowledge of stenography and typewriting is required. Men only will be admitted to this examination. The age limits are 18 years or over on the day of examination. Persons who desire to enter the examination should apply to the local secretary, board of civil service examiners, at the local postoffice, this city, or to the secretary, Eleventh Civil Service District, Post Office Building, Seattle, Wash., for application blank, Form 1571, and information for applicants.

NEW YORK, July 31.—After a visit to the scene of the oil workers strike at Bayonne, N. J., Mrs. J. Sargeant Cram, wife of Public Service Commissioner Cram, and a noted social worker, announced that she was in sympathy with the strikers.

"These poor strikers deserve anything they can force these tyrannical companies to give them," she said. "I am horrified by some of the things I have learned. Living conditions for these poor people in Bayonne is wretched beyond description."
