WORLD TO BE RID OF HUMBACKS THROUGH OSTEOPATHY HE SAYS

MODERN METHOD OF TREATMENT WILL SOON ERASE THE DEFORMITY.

Dr. Harry W. Forbes, Head of the Los Angeles College of Osteopathy, Physicians Makes Prediction at the Closing Session of the Convention at Portland.

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 6.—The world is to be rid of humbacks. This statement was made today at the closing session of the international osteopathic convention by Dr. Harry W. Forbes, president of the Los Angeles College of Osteopathic Physicians and Surgeons. Dr. Forbes declared that the next generation would witness the disappearance of humbacks from the face of the earth, and as a result of modern methods of diagnosis and treatment, a humback will become a curiosity of medical history instead of the frequent spectacle it is today, although there has been a rapid decrease in the last few years. Humback is a deformity, ex-

plained Dr. Forbes, which is a sequel to Pott's disease or tuberculosis of the spine. Early diagnosis of this condition with prompt treatment permits a tubercular area to heal with a stiff, straight spine instead of with a hump which is the result of the pull of gravity of the diseased vertebrae which buckle under the weight when they are unseparated. Osteopathic treatment in these conditions, Dr. Forbes claimed, together with proper support, spells a new era of hope for the victims of this disease.

Dr. Otis Atkins, orthopedic specialist of Portland, is the chairman of the orthopedic section of this convention and in charge of the specific program today. Dr. Harrison W. Mathey, professor of orthopedic surgery at the Chicago College of Osteopathy, read a technical paper upon "Orthopedics and Osteopathy." "Go barefoot" was the advice given by Dr. R. Kendrick Smith, the osteopathy, read a technical paper upon the weak foot. The American feet, he declared are being ruined by shoes.

Ships Chartered to Carry Grain

THREE VESSELS TAKEN AT PORTLAND—STEAM RATES ARE HELD HIGH.

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 5.—Three steamers have been taken for grain loading here in the past two days the latest being the British tramp Snowdonian, which was fixed yesterday at 35 shillings for the United Kingdom, with the usual options, and she is to be available for September-October loading. The first steamer, announced Wednesday, was the Japanese tramp Tokai Maru, fixed by M. H. Houser, and then it became known that the British steamer Highbury had been taken by Kerr, Gifford & Co., which firm is reported to have been negotiating with to supply the cargo of the Snowdonian.

Like the Tokai Maru, the Snowdonian will carry in the neighborhood of 5000 tons, dead weight. She is of 2402 tons net register and was last reported arriving at Liverpool June 8 from Savannah. The Highbury reached the river at 11:30 o'clock yesterday and left up at 4 o'clock.

Other steamers engaged for comparatively early loading are the Japanese tramp Asama Maru, which left Newcastle July 7 for Honolulu and Portland to load for Australia; the British steamer Caldergrove, which reached Auckland July 9 on her way to Wellington, Lyttelton and Dunedin, from where she proceeds here; the Norwegian steamer Arinda, arriving at Manila July 12 from New York, and now bound this way, and the British stamer Rosalie, which left Rio Janeiro June 29 for Leth and is to head here, and the British steamer Reading, arriving on the Tyne July 1 from Taver.

The situation as to tonnage is not causing uneasiness, though 35 shillings is held to be a decidedly high rate, and that feature is not pleasing to exporters. There has been no chartering of sailing vessels during the past few days, so they are regarded as being available to current rates.

The engagement of the French ship Ernest Reyer last week for South Africa was done at 50 shillings, and it is thought that there will be a greater range between sail and steam tonnage during the remainder of the season than was the case last year.

Chartering for straight lumber cargo has not been active this week, though there are orders held along the river to be moved, mostly to the United Kingdom and other European ports which the allies control.

Library News

At the regular meeting of the library board Thursday evening the following report was given by the librarian.

"The circulation of books has kept up unusually well for a summer month, there being a gain of 456 volumes in Pendleton over July of 1914 and 1574 volumes gain in the branches, making a total gain of 2030 volumes or 140 per cent over the same month of last year. The total this July was 3525.

Since the library has been closed evenings during the hot weather, the library staff has not heard a single complaint regarding the shorter hours, while several have thought it a very good plan. Neither has the circulation been affected by it.

The last number of "Public Libraries" published in Chicago, given Contra Costa county, Calif., the credit for being the first library to ask the Carnegie Corporation for a system of county branch libraries and states that they have been given three bungalow buildings at \$1500 each. I have written to the librarian of Contra Costa county and find that their request for buildings was sent in April of this year while our library was dated November 9 of last year, making us five or six months ahead of them. Their plans have not yet been made or accepted so our library can claim the distinction of being the first to ask for a system of county branch libraries and ours included a central building as well. We will see that the correction is made in the next number of "Public Libraries" that will give Oregon and Umatilla county credit.

Copies of the local papers that gave cuts and descriptions of the new library have been sent to several of the libraries of Oregon and Washington and to the executive committee of the Pacific Northwest Library Association reminding them that this is the place in which they were invited to hold the library convention in 1916.

In planning for the future growth

of our county library system, it has occurred to me that the library buildings that we hope to put up in towns of Umatilla county might be the nuclei of civic centers in these towns. In most places the library will be the first public building aside from the schools and in every place it would be the most attractive public building. Books and magazines are treating more and more of modern methods of planning and laying out of cities and the proper grouping of public buildings.

Would it not be fitting that the county library board take the initiative in helping every town in the county to plan for a suitable civic center by having the library building a model building in every way and adapted to a site on which other buildings could be grouped later as needed.

If it had been planned to arrange Pendleton's new postoffice, new library, city hall and court house on opposite banks of the Umatilla river with suitable grounds and a beautiful bridge connecting them as has been done in Des Moines, Iowa, Pendleton would have had one more show feature that would have been the pride of the city and the envy of many larger cities. City planning would not be expensive if begun in time. Other smaller cities will grow to need these buildings more and more, and is it any too early to plan ahead and see to it that the libraries are rightly placed in relation to future public buildings?
