950 SACKS A DAY IS RECORD FOR HARVEST

AVERAGE OF 54 BUSHELS AN ACRE AT BRENT'S RANCH AT VINCENT.

(Special Correspondence.) VINCENT, Freewater, Ore., Aug. 18.—Chas. P. Dixon, who has been harvesting with the Claude Reel combine outfit, returned home yesterday after a good run of 27 days. The run for the season averaged 950 sacks per day. On the Judge Brents ranch east of Freewater, the yield for the 490 acres averaged 54 bushels to the acre and it was estimated six bushels shatterd. At times sacks were filled every 40 seconds.

CHOLM.

Cholm has been one of the most interesting of Polish towns under Russian administration, for from this quiet corner of subject Poland the government program for the Russification of the Poles has been directed, says a descriptive statement issued by the National Geographic Society. Just over the Russian border, surrounded by endless acres of forest and agricultural land, the whole region in which it lies possessed of but indifferent means for communication, and so, screened from the feverish, suspicious politics of Warsaw and other Polish centers, Cholm, in peace times, was a strategic point, in peace times was a strategic point, in peace times was a strategic point.

The Russian ideals, the Russian tongue, Russian methods and the Russian religion entered Poland by way of Cholm, and from here painstaking efforts were made to spread them among all the peasantry. The Russian point of view has sought to penetrate by way of the Cholm-Lublin-Ivangorod railway line, and from here, too, it has made its way south, even beyond the Galician borders to the great Polish city of Lemberg. Thus Cholm, which the Russian soldiers defended so splendidly, was a Russian stronghold in more senses than one. It was the sentimental and intellectual heart of the Russian program in Poland.

Cholm is the seat of a Russian bishop. The national Greek church, though it claims but few followers over the Polish boundary, is here strongly entrenched. The city supports a number of Greek churches,

and an ecclesiastical seminary long founded here offers to the Poles and to the Russian missionaries to the Poles the learning of the Greek church. The Russian church has based its efforts for Cholm for the conversion of the Poles to the "Church of most of the Slavs." Its success, however, is still hanging in the balance.

The city is very ancient. It was founded by Daniel, Prince of Gallitz, as business headquarters for rich family estates. It is today a living specimen of archaeology, with the shell fire of today shaking this out of date, time-sleepy city must cause an uncanny realization among its citizens of the strides that the ages must have made since Cholm last came into immediate contact with the outside world. The city, most of which was built without a plan, probably a home for 20,000 people, and before the outbreak of the war provided an arsenal, a quiet but powerful source of Russification plans and sinews.

Lublin, the important manufacturing town of this part of Russian Poland, lies 45 miles westnorthwest of Cholm, by the Kief-Warsaw railway. Cholm forms the south termination of the strategic railroad that has been captured by the Germans—that north and south line of the Bug, reinforced and continued north from the Bug by the Cholm-Brest-Litovsk-Brestok-Oswiec railway. Its possession is of great military importance. The country around Cholm grows an abundance of grains and is also very rich in its production of other agricultural products.

Britain Arouses Sweden.

STOCKHOLM, Aug. 18.—The British government has refused to permit two shipments of coal purchased

by a Swedish firm for the Swedish navy to leave England.

The incident has brought forth much bitter comment from the Swedish press and is absorbing the attention of the public.
