JACKSON HIGHWAY IS GAINING MUCH SUPPORT

MAIMI, Fla., Aug. 18.—The Jackson Highway, which will link the north and south as the Lincoln highway will connect to east and west, is gaining much support in the southern states. The proposed road will run from Chicago to Miami, and as present planned, will traverse Alabama, Kentucky, Illinois and Florida, though Ohio and Georgia and Indiana are anxious to have it pass through their territory. Under the auspices of the Dixie Highway association, which is backing several moves for better roads in Dixie, the Jackson scheme is fast being whipped into shape. Committees have been formed in all the interested states and it is probable the active work of construction will begin some time this fall. There are already over a hundred county commissioners in the different states.
