### SWINE TRADE TAKES SLUMP

(Courtesy Monday's Journal.)  
PORTLAND, Ore. — It was mighty poor picking for hog shippers at various marketing centers today. Values were sharply reduced at all points and a spell of weakness enveloped all stockyard markets of the country.  
The extreme slowness of the product and the overall surplus of products, caused packing interests to go very slow in their buying at leading centers this morning.  
Locally there was a drop of 15c in the price of swine today. This morning a very limited amount of business passed at North Portland with extreme bids around \$7.25, but killers showed little inclination to hurry purchases at any price.  
That of all to cause "cold feet" among the buyers of swine was the announcement of a run over Sunday at 2598 head, the greatest run for a very long time, although last Monday the showing was 2025 head.  
Eastern markets reflected considerable weakness at the start of the day's trade and at practically all points losses were liberal.

Cattle Market is Slow.  
Killers were not inclined to rush purchases of cattle in the North Portland market this morning. Slowness in the hog trade was soon spread to the cattle pens. In spots the market was inclined to reflect weakness, but in other points the feeling was just about steady.  
Run of cattle in the local yards over Sunday, while not so heavy as last week, was greater than immediate requirements of the trade justified. Killers held off their purchases with the idea of securing bargains.

### STEAMER RAMMED AND SUNK AT SEATTLE DOCK; 1 KILLED

SEATTLE, Wash., Aug. 31.—The steamer Admiral Watson, Captain M. M. Jones, operated by the Pacific Alaska Navigation Company between Seattle and Southeastern Alaska ports, was rammed and sunk while discharging cargo at her dock here Sunday by the Pacific Coast Steamship Company's freighter Paraiso.  
By high tide the Admiral Watson lay partly on her side with a hole two feet wide and ten feet long amidships on her starboard side. Only her bow and pilothouse remained out of the water. The damage to the Admiral Watson is estimated at \$50,000. The Paraiso was uninjured.  
The accident was due to a heavy fall of smoke from forest fires overhanging the bay and obscuring the waterfront. According to Andrew Bjorkland, the pilot, who was moving the Paraiso from one pier to another to take on additional cargo the denseness of the smoke forced the Paraiso to stand close enough in to be able to discern each pier as it loomed up, the smoke being so thick at this time that the pilot could not see 20 yards ahead.  
The dock to which the Admiral Watson was moored projects into the bay at the end of a curve in the shoreline, and in hugging the shore the Paraiso struck the Admiral Watson squarely amidship, her stern sinking rapidly in 40 feet of water.  
J. Filmore, a longshoreman, was knocked unconscious by a falling timber and died a few hours later.  
The Admiral Watson had about 200 tons of freight on board when rammed and was expected to sail for the north. The vessel is 253 feet long, 38 feet beam, with a tonnage of 1820.
