**Many Doves Being Shot.**  
Dove pie is now a table delicacy in Umatilla county, the open season on doves having opened September 1. Many of the birds are being killed as their meat is highly prized. The season will remain open until November 1st.

**Illegal Shooting on McKay.**  
Reports have reached Deputy Game Warden Tonkin of illegal shooting of pheasants on McKay creek about eight miles from Pendleton and he is making an investigation to ascertain whether there is enough evidence for a prosecution.

**Talking Round-up in Portland.**

**Topperweas Here Tomorrow.**

They will shoot at the golf links about 10 o'clock in the morning and invite the public to witness them. Both make any number of difficult shots and their exhibition is well worth watching.

**Swimming Pool Filled.**

**Pilot Rock Woman Dies.**

Today is the 39th day upon which there has been no rain, according to the records kept by the official weather observer. Indications are, however, that the dry spell will be broken before long as there is a smell of rain in the air and a cloudy sky. Last year the dry spell continued for 52 days.
