COWLES DIVORCE TRIAL PROMISES TO PACK COURT



PORTSMOUTH, N. H., Sept. 7.—The Cowles divorce case will probably be called in this city on Friday. Since the filing of the divorce libel in this court on December, 1914, by Mrs. Florence Cowles, against Dr. Edward S. Cowles, formerly of Boston, efforts have been made to effect an outside settlement and to avoid publicity. The trial is expected to crowd the courtroom with eager auditors.

In 1909 Dr. Cowles figured in a mixup at a Boston navy yard dance. The fracas resulted in the court martial of Assistant Surgeon A. H. Robnett and Paymaster George P. Auld of the U. S. navy.

Mrs. Cowles, who was married to the physician after an elopement in 1905, is a daughter of Harry J. Jaquith, lawyer, of Brookline, Mass. It was reported that the parents of the bride were opposed to the match and became reconciled only shortly before the filing of the divorce papers.

In her libel Mrs. Cowles names a nurse employed at the time the suit was filed, at Dr. Cowles sanitarium here. Other women in Portland and Boston are also named. Both parents will fight for the possession of the two children. In his counter libel the physician names several other persons.
