Chief of Police Kearney yesterday picked up R. R. Draper, a convict who escaped from a wood camp near Salem some time ago. He communicated with Warden Minto at once and received instructions to hold the man. The chief recognized the man on the streets as a typical convict and identified him later. "You've got the wrong sow by the ear this time," the man told him but later admitted his identity. He was sent to the penitentiary for stealing cocaine from a physician at Harbman after

the federal drug law took effect. The officers found innumerable marks made by a hypodermic needle on his arm. Draper declares every man but himself and a life term at the wood camp was paroled. "It made me mad," he said, "so I left."

Apples Bring 55 Cents a Box.
PORTLAND, Ore., Sept. 8.—The highest price for apples in five years was paid here today in a big deal which involves approximately 404 cars of fruit. Every box of "C" grade apples, controlled by the North Pacific Fruit Distributors this season, sold at the rate of 55 cents a box.
