This country is so large and the conditions vary so greatly are drifting into diseases un-the added protection of the new type of coast defense guns. Much has been heard since last April of the great range and power of the 15 inch guns of the new British super-dreadnought Queen Elizabeth, but the event has proved that the effect of their fire upon the Turkish forts at the Dardanelles has been far less than was to be expected. The familiar fact has again been demonstrated that in the face of the heaviest naval fire modern fortifications remain impregnible.

The fanciful picture has frequently been drawn of late by excited patriots of foreign warships standing far offshore and from a safe range reducing to ruins our coast defenses. In a test by the best battle-ship afloat it is more than doubtful if it could be done. With the new 16 inch guns in place at Cape Henry or Sandy Hook it would be wholly out of the question.—New York World.
