NEW YORK, Sept. 8.—Wide search is being made for fifteen year old Viola Stevens, who disappeared from her Brooklyn home at the same time her schoolboy sweetheart, Max Goodman, vanished. A letter from the boy in Jersey indicates the couple are traveling west by freight. The girl, it was found, cropped her hair and dressed in boy's clothing after leaving home. The two boys found wandering about at Lake Mahopac, thought to be the Goodman boy and the Stevens girl, proved to be two schoolboys from Bridgeport.

Aviators Take Reprisals

PARIS, Sept. 11.—Reprisals by French aviators for an attack September 1 on Lunenburg, where there is no defence, were taken on Saarbrücken by French aviators. A French official report says: "Our aviators, ever since the beginning of their operations the day and the hour of the market. Commerce department experts are afraid that Manila's million-bale hemp crop will flood the campaign clear market.

The wedding cake, bridal veil and other trappings which were to have been employed in a fashionable wedding in Mrs. Thomas' beautiful home in Wilford Court, New York, will not be needed. Miss Wilmerding, who is one of the charming young favorites of eastern summer resort society, received short notice recently from Mr. Burch that he had been suddenly called upon to make a journey over the country which would take months.

Submarine Sinks Steamer. LONDON, Sept. 11.—The British steamer Cornelia, 1700 tons, and sunk by a German submarine off Alexandria on the east of Suez. The fishing vessel Hesperia also was torpedoed, but the crews were rescued.

Back Broken; Man Works

CLARKSBURG, W. Va., Sept. 13.—With back broken, left leg cut off near the knee, two fingers of the left hand gone, W. H. Satterfield shovels coal and earns a good living for a family of six children at the mine of the McGraw Coal company, at Simpson, near here.

Fifteen years ago he fell over a cliff at a stone quarry and suffered a fractured back. Physicians said at the time he couldn't get well. His left leg has been operated on four times. The bone is diseased and is said to be slowly decaying. It is necessary to amputate the bone often. Straps are arranged diagonally across both shoulders keep the broken back in place and serve to hold the wood on to the stump of the live limb.

Satterfield operates a fan in the mine. He shovels about four tons a day, keeping the buffer of the fan running going.
