Holy Land Armed Camp. JERUSALEM, Sept. 15.—Armed airships and aeroplanes are continually flying over the birthplace of the Prince of Peace at Bethlehem, according to the Bote Aus Zion (Messenger from Zion), a paper published in Palestine by a Swiss missionary.

Soldiers are maneuvering every day on the Mount of Olives at Golgotha and Jerusalem. Between Judea and Jericho, where transportation was by mule pack in the days when Christ came to bring "peace on earth," a road is being constructed for armored motor cars.

Fast dromedaries of the camel corps maintain communication between the camps in Palestine and the Turkish headquarters. It is supposed that the concentration of the young recruits in the Holy Land is with a view to another attack on Egypt.

Man Believed Lost in Fire. HOQUIAM, Wash., Sept. 15.—John Enquist, a watchman, cannot be found today and probably was cremated in a fire that destroyed the Cahasset Hotel, the largest on the North Pacific coast last night. The loss is \$25,000, partly insured. Near-by cottages were saved. The hotel had been closed for some time and the origin of the fire is a mystery.

It is said that one pound of coal burned under the boilers in the big power house of the Interboro Rapid Transit Co. in New York, will carry one passenger over a distance of two miles.

Offer of Over a Million Made to Bring on Strike

GERMAN AGENTS ALLEGED TO HAVE SOUGHT TO TIE UP ALL SHIPPING

TOLEDO, Ohio, Sept. 15.—German agents offered President O'Connor of the Longshoremen's national organization one million and thirty five thousand dollars if he would cause a month's general strike of the Longshoremen on Pacific and Atlantic docks, O'Connor declared today. A Boston man, he said, offered a big bribe for a strike at Atlantic ports. Such a strike was intended to hamper shipments of munitions to the allies and give the Austro-German agents an opportunity to blow up the vessels.

PROVIDENCE, R. I., Sept. 15.—Charles H. Mohr, of Baltimore, son of the slain Dr. C. Franklin Mohr of this city, has so far been unable to locate the will of his father, who is reported to have left an estate of about half a million dollars. Mr. Mohr states that his father's second wife, Mrs. Elizabeth Tiffany Mohr, accused of conspiring with three negroes now held in jail to murder her husband, has promised him his share in his father's estate.

ST. LOUIS, Sept. 15.—Constable John Pigg of Mt. Vernon, Ill., is full of righteous indignation. When he scanned the public prints recently he saw Enrich Braatz of St. Louis, heralded as the world's champion pancake eater, all because Braatz had eaten 65 pancakes to prove that his wife was a good cook and that indigestion did not lurk in her vitals. Pigg seized his trusty pen and sent the following screed to the editor: "I can beat that all holler if I have beer to drink with it. I am constable, city park, here, and every body knows the Pigg family are heavy eaters. If we can drink a bottle of beer for every 10 pancakes, I will cove over and beat him or bust, for I know I can."

Woodland Farmer Killed.

WOODLAND, Wash., Sept. 15.—Robert Simpson, owner of a \$10,000 ranch on the edge of town, was killed in a runaway four miles northeast of the city. He died a few minutes after he was found, lying by a rock crusher, by neighbors.
