"Warrior's Wrist" Is Latest.

LONDON, Sept. 2.—(By Mail)—Following the "Trench Knee," the "Warrior's Wrist" is the latest soldier malady reported from Northern France.

It's the peculiar affliction of the wrist and elbow caused by wearing of a strap watch with uniform. Ninety per cent of all the soldiers wear them. Fifty per cent of the 90 have developed "Warrior's Wrist"—painful at times but not serious.

Frequent glances at the timepiece cause the damage. The arm is flung out with the elbow slightly bent and the palm of the hand down.

There is a pause and then a reflex motion that brings the hand up toward the nose.

It takes three weeks to develop the peculiar muscular strain commonly known as "Warrior's Wrist."
