"MOVIE" ACTRESS NEAR DEATH FROM A FALL

MAREL NORMAND, POPULAR FILM GIRL, NOT EXPECTED TO RECOVER.

LOS ANGELES, Sept. 21.—While everything known to medical science was being done to save her life, Marel Normand, well known film star and comedy actress, was reported unconscious and at the point of death in her apartment here, where she has been confined for the past week. Her physician, Dr. O. M. Justice, stated the chances for her recovery were slight.

Miss Normand's illness was attributed to an accident in which she fell several days ago, sustaining injuries to her head. She has never regained consciousness, according to her physician.

EVANS IS DECLARED WINNER OVER CLARK IN 29 ROUND FIGHT

Bobby Evans last night regained his title of northwest lightweight champion when, at the end of 29 rounds of fast fighting, he was given the decision over Tommy Clark, who had secured the title from Billy Farrell. The decision was not at all satisfactory to many of the fans but Referee Hyberg held that Evans had outpointed the other boxer, more especially in the last ten rounds.

The bout was staged in the Athens pavilion and there was a large crowd present. The Athens contingent was back of Clark while Weston sent over a strong delegation of boosters for Evans. The Pendleton fans were divided in their support.

The two scrappers mixed it lively throughout the engagement. Neither was damaged to any great extent. Once Clark went to his knees but whether from a blow or a slip it is hard to say. At any rate he was not shaken.

The majority of the fans thought a draw decision would be given and when Hyberg held up Evans' hand there was a hubbub. It continued outside the pavilion and some of the more excited ones carried their arguments to blows.

Evans arrived in Pendleton this morning, being manager of Billy Mascott, and declares he beat Clark in the last ten rounds of the fight. He says he is willing to give Clark a rematch but not to meet Billy Farrell again.

Clark is very indignant over the decision. He came to Pendleton this morning and does not hesitate to say that he was robbed. "I beat him in 15 out of the 29 rounds," he declares, "and carried the fight to him from first to last. A draw decision would have been giving Evans the better of it."

JESS WILLARD WILL MEET ANY HEAVY IF PURSE IS LARGE ONE
