**Thompson a Little Better.**  
 The condition of Sam R. Thompson, who is very ill at his home, is reported a little better today.

**Case is Non-Suited.**  
 The case of John Vaughan of Enterprise vs. J. L. Hammack, set for trial today, was nonsuited when the plaintiff failed to appear and the defendant was given a judgment. The plaintiff was suing for \$600. His attorney, J. A. Burleigh, did not appear this morning and the case was postponed until 1:30 when W. M. Peterson, attorney for the defendant, asked for judgment.

**Many Milton People Coming.**  
 That many people from the east end of the county will be here for the Round-up is the statement of George Talbert, member of the Milton band, who came on in advance of the band today in order to be present for the opening of Happy Canyon. He states that the people of the east end are strong for the Round-up above all other frontier shows and are coming in great numbers.

**Announcers Are Announced.**  
 The announcing system at the Round-up this year will be the same as last year. There will be three 'crows' nests, one at each end and one in the center and each will be connected with the judges' stand by telephone. Lee D. Drake in the judges' stand will transmit the results over the wires to the 'crows' nests and they will thus be announced to every part of the audience at once. In the 'crows' nests will be Ray Crystal, Fred J. McMonies and R. E. Chloupek. They tried out their voices early this morning and frightened all of the stock in the corrals.

**Umatilla Wants Her Water.**  
 The town of Umatilla is making strong efforts to have the O-W. R. & N. Co. complete its part of the water system in that town, according to A. G. Means who is up today. Some time ago the town bonded itself to put in a distribution system and is now paying interest on these bonds. The O-W. company dug a well 260 feet deep and secured a supply of pure water but has never erected any tower or tank. Consequently, the Umatillians have done without their new water system. Mr. Means as a representative of the council went to Portland this week and conferred with President Farrell who has started action toward relieving the condition, there.

**SMOKES PIPE OVER BOX OF POWDER; IS KILLED**  
 EUGENE, Ore., Sept. 22.—W. C. Keever, 55 years old, residing at Pleasant Hill, was killed almost instantly when about 15 sticks of giant powder with which he was working exploded. He was working with a country road crew 20 miles west of Eugene near the village of Franklin. Keever was seen stooping over a box of giant powder and caps and was smoking a pipe. His fellow employees think sparks from the pipe ignited the caps and caused the explosion. He leaves a wife and seven children, some of whom are grown. He also has a brother, John Keever, in Eugene.

 ment estimates of June and July to bear the price but are saying nothing about the 30 per cent loss in harvesting the crop.

The buyers understand the situation better than the farmers. At Chicago, Minneapolis and Duluth there has been 50c difference between spot wheat and Sept. 30 delivery, showing that it is actually worth 50 cents more per bushel than they are bidding. And if they could not borrow our wheat they would have to pay that price. But as long as farmers will ship their wheat to them, and allow them to use it, they will not have to buy any wheat, but will use that to keep down the price of what is left at home.

If I could borrow horses until after harvest, they would not cost so much then.

## REDMOND MAN TELEGRAPHS FOR FOUR FEET OF SPACE

"Reserve me four feet of space in the grandstand for all three days." This was the rather queer wording of a telegram received yesterday by the Round-up directors from H. M. Stewart of Redmond, Oregon. It was turned over to Tom Boylen, Jr. who is in charge of the ticket sale, and he was very much perplexed inasmuch as the grandstand space is not sold by the foot. Inquiries around town, however, soon revealed the reason for the strange request. Mr. Stewart has friends here and they explained that Mr. Stewart is a man of generous proportions, in fact weighs something over 300 pounds. He attended the Round-up last year but his enjoyment was marred by the fact that he had not room enough in his seat. The eighteen inches measured off for each person was far too small and, to avoid any similar situation this year, Mr. Stewart asked for four running feet. The telegram thus explained, Mr. Boylen reserved him two seats for each day and made them aisle seats so that, if the three feet is not enough, he can hang over in the aisle.

**French Shell Enemy.**
