

### Newsy Notes of Pendleton

**Prairie City Owns Here.**  
 Rod McHaley, a big cattleman of Prairie City, arrived yesterday to attend the Round-up and brought word that three auto loads of Prairie City people are on their way here for the big show.

**All the Way From "Old Virginia."**  
 Mrs. Horan of Shenandoah, Virginia, arrived this morning to see Pendleton's big frontier show. She will meet here a brother from British Columbia.

**Rosenberg Funeral Held.**  
 At 10 o'clock this morning in the Polson chapel, the funeral of John Rosenberg, local jeweler, who died yesterday morning, was held. Rev. Charles Quimby of the Church of the Redeemed, preached the funeral sermon. The local lodge of Elks, of which deceased was a member, officiated at the graveside.

**Motion Picture Man Here.**  
 J. G. Sill of the Sill Motion Picture Co. of Portland, who secured the exclusive privilege of filming the 1915 Round-up exhibition, has arrived in the city. He brought with him three cameras and camera men and plans to get the very best possible pictures. There was more demand for the motion picture concession this year than for several years, owing to the great success which attended the exhibition of the 1914 films in the east last year.

**No Parking on Main Street.**  
 After today for the remainder of the week, automobile drivers will not

be permitted to park their cars on Main street longer than 15 minutes. Neither will they be allowed to park them around the city hall. This order was promulgated this morning by Chief of Police Manning as a measure to prevent congestion of traffic on the principal street.

**Past Champions here.**  
 "Red" Parker, champion buckaroo of 1914, is back for the Round-up, as is John Spain, winner in 1911.

**Library Hours During Round-up.**  
 The public library will open at 9 o'clock, one hour earlier in the forenoon during Round-up for the convenience of visitors in the city, and will open the regular evening hours from seven to nine. It will be closed during the afternoons only.

**School Closes for Round-up.**  
 At 5 o'clock this afternoon the public schools of Pendleton close until next Monday morning on account of the Round-up. This will give the pupils a two-day vacation and a free opportunity to enjoy the festivities to the utmost. All school children will be admitted free to the bleachers tomorrow afternoon.

**Fire Ins. Co. Sued.**  
 S. C. Snyder and wife yesterday afternoon filed suit against the Springfield Fire & Marine Insurance Co. for judgment for \$1100, alleged to be due on a policy held with the company. Plaintiffs alleged they suffered a loss of \$1352.43 from a fire which destroyed the property insured. Raley & Raley are attorneys for the plaintiff.

**Contestants Draw Tonight.**  
 The contestants who are to take part in the Round-up will draw for positions and mounts this evening at 7:30 in the accommodation headquarters in the East Oregonian building. To this drawing the cowboys attach much importance as a good rider has little opportunity to demonstrate his abilities unless he gets a hard buck-er.

**Will Take in the Round-up.**  
 Governor Alexander of Idaho and party will arrive here from Boise at 2:15 tomorrow morning en route to San Francisco to attend the exposition. At least one member of the party, State Senator E. W. Bowman, will stop off to attend the Round-up tomorrow. Senator Bowman is a brother of S. F. Bowman of the local portoffice force and will visit him while here.

**Fifty From Portland.**  
 When No. 18 pulled into Pendleton last evening, there were aboard 49 Portland people, an advance guard of the many coming from that city to the Round-up. J. L. Miller, traveling passenger agent, was aboard and secured the figures. Mr. Miller also received word that the Baker delegation coming Friday night has grown so large that three special Pullman cars have been ordered.

**Boy Stole Horse Also.**  
 When Frank Cannon, the boy who stole J. T. Lambirth's canoe and paddled it as far as the Furnish dam on an intended trip to Portland, was brought back to Pendleton, he proved to be the same boy who recently stole a saddle horse at Granite and for whom Sheriff Welch of that city had been looking. His home is in the Milton-Freswater section and Deputy Sheriff West of Milton recognized him this morning. The boy is only 12 years old.

**L. R. Stinson Is Here.**  
 L. R. Stinson, grand keeper of records and seal, Knights of Pythias, has been here today visiting local members of the order and during his stay was the guest of J. W. Maloney. Mr. Stinson is en route back to Salem after having visited as far east as Huntington. The grand lodge Knights of Pythias meets in Portland October 12 and the Pendleton representatives will be Sam Palne, holdover; I. E. Young, C. P. Strain, H. M. Elder and Rev. J. E. Snyder.

**Plaintiff Gets Verdict.**  
 L. S. Kidd yesterday won a verdict in the cases he had against Frank Michael and Charles Michael which were tried together in the circuit court. The jury went out last evening and returned sealed verdicts. Plaintiff was given a verdict of \$156.50 against Frank Michael and one for \$57.50 against Charles Michael. He sued for pasturage and defendants entered counter claims for animals alleged to have been lost. Osmer E. Smith and J. Roy Raley were attorneys for the plaintiff.

**Forgot to Pay Taxi Driver.**  
 W. H. Brazell was one of the number of colored gentlemen who traveled about the city in a taxi-cab yesterday afternoon. They were "real sports" until it came to paying the driver, when they balked. The driver bucked and as a result Mr. Brazell was taken into custody by the police. Judge Fitz Gerald is now considering the penalty which should be imposed. There were some eight or ten drunks in court this morning also.

**Ex-County Judge Dies.**  
 H. G. Yoakum, former county judge of Umatilla county and one of the residents in the early days of the original Happy Canyon, died last Thursday in Meadows, Idaho, according to word received here by J. M. Bentley. Ex-Judge Yoakum was about 50 years old at his death. The funeral was held Sunday. All old-timers will remember the deceased as he was one of the best known pioneers of the county. The station of Yoakum near which was the original Happy Canyon, was named for him. He was an uncle of Col. Bentley's late wife of Mrs. Thomas Hopper and of John and William Baker of this city.
