the streets and went through the steps of the old fashioned cowboys' horseshoe dance. Event followed event in rapid succession and there were no dull moments. Some of the features which made big hits last year were repeated this year with variations but some of the most entertaining stunts were entirely original.

There was bucking aplenty. Sharkey, the big Belgrade bull, piled a rider and nearly tore part of the town down. Hotfoot did a cakewalk while trying vainly to shake a rider off. Mrs. Frank McCarrell mounted a bucking steer barebacked and was thrown after a sensational ride and three bucking burros kept the crowd in an uproar with their antics.

With a spotlight playing upon her and her beautiful black horse, Miss Reber, dressed in her costume as a cowgirl queen, sang a beautiful number which was heard throughout the pavilion.

One of the comedy stunts which caught the fancy of the crowd was the surgical operation performed by the village doctor. One of the bad men having been shot, he was dragged on to a table, and, with saw and ax, the doctor amputated his legs at the knees. To the surprise and hysterical delight of the crowd, the patient jumped off the table and walked away on his stumps.

One of the most dramatic incidents occurred just at the close of the tank hold-up. As the robbers galloped away, bullets were sent after them and one horse and rider fell to the ground. The rider was Ben Corbett, well known cowboy, and the horse had been trained in the fall-down feat.

The long horned steer, while wilder than the one used last year, became frightened at the pistol shots, lights and big crowd and was not as much on the fight as the 1914 brute. However, he furnished plenty of excitement. A butting billy-goat also created a good deal of excitement and amusement.

At 9 o'clock the program had been finished and the crowd turned loose in the town. There was a steady run on the bank for currency and soon the crowds about the gaming tables were so dense that, even with the double space provided this year, moving was almost impossible. Everyone took a turn at one game or another and some had phenomenal luck, one man breaking four banks in succession.

A source of a good deal of amusement was the "chute the chutes" down which yelling cowboys slid for more than an hour before they had their fill of the sensation.

All in all, Happy Canyon on its first night was a great success and each succeeding night will be better.
