GERMAN ADMIRALTY BELIEVES HESPERIAN WAS SUNK BY A MINE

BERLIN, Sept. 23.—The admiralty submitted to the foreign office a memorandum declaring positively that no submarine sank the liner Hesperian. The statement, however, suggested the possibility that the vessel struck a mine which was intended to destroy a submarine. The admiralty stated the last submarine which was operating in the war zone the day of the Hesperian explosion returned and reported.

Commanders of submarines reported many mines were floating in the Irish sea, tending to strengthen the theory the Hesperian may have fouled one of them. The memorandum probably will be embodied in a note to the United States. In some quarters it was reported the note had already been delivered to Ambassador Gerard but this could not be confirmed.

FOUR ARE INDICTED AS ALLEGED ARSON TRUST

PORTLAND, Ore., Sept. 23.—Four members of the alleged "arson syndicate" were indicted by the grand jury after they had deliberated two days over disclosures made by District Attorney Evans and Fire Marshal Jay Stevens as to the existence of a coastwide organization for the purpose of setting fires and collecting insurance.

Those indicted are Mordie Keeney, formerly a lieutenant in the Portland fire department; George W. Woollette, a plumber; William Stewart, and a fourth man, whose name is withheld by the authorities pending his arrest.

Two Confess Part in Fires.

Woollette and Stewart made complete statements to the authorities admitting their connection with a number of fires and implicating Keeney and several others. Keeney is the only man thus far arrested in connection with the arson disclosures who maintains his innocence.

Woollette and Stewart at present are at liberty on their own promise to appear when wanted. Keeney is in the county jail under \$5000 bonds. Sanford W. Currier, the first man indicted for the "firebug" activities, is still in jail awaiting trial.

Fearing that an attempt may be made on his life as a result of his confession, the authorities say Stewart has appealed to them to put him in jail or hurry his case to a climax.

ALL PASSENGERS SAVED FROM BURNING VESSEL

NEW YORK, Sept. 23.—Only the quick arrival of the liner Tuscania and the efficiency of her fire fighting apparatus probably prevented the recent fire aboard the Greek steamer Athina in mid-ocean from resulting in another great ocean tragedy. The Tuscania has arrived here with 400 passengers, which she saved from what seemed certain death. Both the Tuscania and the Athina captains declared the Greek ship was a victim of an incendiary. Everybody aboard was rescued, though one second class passenger died of heart disease, induced by excitement. Officers and passengers related a thrilling story of the blaze at sea.

Was Costly to Swiss.

PARIS, Sept. 24.—Switzerland's expenses for mobilization up to September 1 amounted to \$25,000,000. President Motta made this announcement in a speech to the national council. The president said that if the war continues 10 months longer the nation's mobilization expenses would reach \$50,000,000.

Switzerland faces a net deficit of \$20,000,000 at the end of three years. It is expected this will necessitate the creation of new financial resources, such as a tobacco monopoly.
