Japan Will Not Help.
TOKYO, Sept. 25.—The allies are reported to be planning to ask Japan to either send troops to the Dardanelles to aid in a quick dash on Constantinople or to Russia to make it impossible for Germany to divert troops from Slav operations toward the Balkans. No official confirmation was obtainable but the report attracted comment in view of the probable entrance of Bulgaria into the European conflict. It is known the allies will be refused if they make the request.
Japan has steadily rejected overtures for armed resistance and intends doing so in the future, it was declared.

American Kidnaped.
WASHINGTON, Sept. 24.—An American whose name is withheld, has been kidnaped from Columbus, N. H., and taken to Mexico, according to a dispatch received at the state department. American border officials have demanded his release. Unless he is given his freedom, American infantry will cross the border and effect his release, according to state department officials. He was captured by bandits who are demanding \$2000 ransom.

SWINE MARKET IS NOT STRONG

(Courtesy Sunday's Journal.)
PORTLAND, Ore.—Hogs were just about able to hold their own at North Portland during the week with tops generally ranging around \$6.65. The limited amount of stuff that went above this price was not sufficient to consider as any sort of market factor.

While hog market prices here were still under depression, there was an erratic time in the eastern trade for the week, values, however, being generally higher. Top high prices at leading American centers yesterday were: Chicago, \$8.45; Kansas City, \$8.20; St. Louis, \$8.50; Omaha, \$7.95; Denver, \$7.65; Portland, \$7.45.

Prevailing hog prices at Portland are the cause of much alarm to those in the industry. Many are inclined to lay the blame upon packing interests here, who secured the co-operation of country interests in greatly increasing the volume of hog production under the promise that values here would remain for all time at least as high as Omaha but generally would be on a parity with Chicago.

Packing interests are somewhat peeved over this placing of the blame and insist that they are scarcely to blame for present conditions. Under normal trade conditions they state the great increase in hog production would easily be absorbed and prices remain high but with the consumptive demand for hogs and hog products unusually low they are unable to take care of offerings.

Insistence is again being made in some quarters that the only hope for the hog industry of the Pacific northwest is for the packers here and elsewhere along the coast to make the price of hogs here the basis for the price of hog products. At the present time the Chicago price is used and eastern packers are able to pay the huge freight from the east to Portland and sell at about the same prices as Pacific northwest killers, who are paying much less money for their swine requirements.

On the other hand, northwest packing interests have another alibi. They claim that the hogs from this section shrink more than do those of the east. Regarding this, there is a wide difference of opinion among livestock interests.

Cattle Market is Slow.
While killers are quite willing to absorb a load of "feed to order" cattle and pay therefor rather fair prices, the fact remains that the cattle trade in general is far from showing health in the Pacific northwest. The fault is not with the killers here because they find it impossible to increase the demand for dressed beef while offerings of cattle continue liberal.

Eastern cattle prices are very good; in fact, at the recent show for stockers and feeders at South St. Joseph, Mo., the lowest price received was \$7 and this was for a lot of 25 Herefords averaging but 612 pounds.
