LONDON, Sept. 25.—The Holland-American liner Eemdyk, flying the Dutch flag enroute from Buenos Aires to Copenhagen was sunk. Thirty-nine of the crew were landed.

NEW YORK, Sept. 25.—The Eemdyk was last reported off the southeast coast of England on Monday.

She is believed to have carried a cargo of grain from Argentina, with a crew of about 55. She probably had no passengers. VETERANS OF UNION LIGHT GUARD TO MEET

WASHINGTON, Sept. 25.—Veterans of the Union Light Guard, who are here attending the encampment of the Grand Army of the Republic, are planning a reunion to be held this week. The Light Guard was the bodyguard of President Lincoln for two years during the civil war.

While conversing with Secretary of War Stanton in 1862, the governor of Ohio offered to obtain a bodyguard for President Lincoln. Secretary Stanton accepted the offer. The governor therefore asked for a picked man from each county in Ohio, but did not say what the service was to be. The mastering officer was Capt. Elmer Olin, Fourth United States cavalry. They left for Washington December 22, 1862, and on reporting to the secretary of war learned for the first time what their duties were to be.

Gas Men in Convention.

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 25.—With delegates and representatives from practically every gas association in the United States, and several foreign countries several hundred gas men opened their annual convention at Native Sons hall today. "Co-operation" is the pass word at the convention and every effort is being made to formulate an interchange of ideas and to bring the foreign and American gas men into closer relationship.

13,000,000 PEOPLE AT SAN FRANCISCO FAIR

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 25.—When the gates of the Panama-Pacific exposition closed at midnight nearly 12,400,000 persons had seen the big fair. Officially 13,325,312 has passed the turnstiles up to Friday night and it was estimated 68,000 or more visited it yesterday.

Ideal September weather has drawn big crowds daily; trains are crowded with belated vacationists. Only two months of the show remain.

One of the main features this week will be the autumn music festival with stars from Boston, New York, Chicago and elsewhere participating.

Marines Kill 40 Haitians.
CAPE HAITIEN, Sept. 27.—In an attack by Haitian rebels on an American force about two miles from Cape Haitien 40 Haitians were killed. Ten Americans were wounded.

The rebels have refused to disarm and the Americans are marching on Haiti-du-Cap, in the Plain of the North.
