Austrians Plan Strikes.

Old Mules Find Market.
KANSAS CITY, Sept. 27.—British agents in the last months have bought more than 15,000 pack mules here, according to statements by local dealers.
Some of the mules taken recently were more than 15 years old, the dealers said. In the last two weeks more than 1500 mules have been shipped out of Kansas City routed by way of New Orleans to Egypt. It is believed the Missouri mules will be used to supply transportation for a new Asiatic campaign against the Turks.

CATTLE PRICES TAKE A SLUMP

PORTLAND, Ore.—Hogs and cattle were weaker and lower today at North Portland with the total run of livestock 89 cars, or the greatest volume of arrivals for a very extended period.

There was another increase in the marketing of hogs at North Portland. Totals over Sunday were 2892 head compared with 2599 last week and 1680 head this same day a year ago. During the early part of the day's trading it was apparent that the situation was not as good as last week's closing and offers of buyers were ranging close to \$6.55 for extreme top quality.
