BIG STOCK BARN OF FORMER RESIDENT OF THIS COUNTY BURNS

PROPERTY OF CHARLES RINEHART IN UNION COUNTY IS DESTROYED.

100 Tons of Hay and 600 Sacks of Oats Were Also a Total Loss—Flames Gave Such Headway That There is No Chance to Extinguish Them—Origin is a Mystery.

Charles Rinehart, who some months ago disposed of his farm holdings in this county and purchased the big Pierce-Sawyer ranch in Union county, suffered a heavy loss by fire Tuesday, according to the following story in the La Grande Observer.

The big stock barn on the former Pierce-Sawyer farm near Hot Lake, now the property of Chas. Rinehart, was destroyed by fire yesterday afternoon. There was also a hundred tons of hay and 600 sacks of oats which were a total loss. A further inventory of loss includes a quantity of household goods which were stored in the barn. In fact there was a complete loss of everything in and about the premises. The horses and most of the harness which were out in the fields escaped.

The fire started about half past 2 o'clock and immediately gained such headway that there was no chance to combat the flames. There is no definite information as to how the fire started. Some of the employees of the place had been at the barn at frequent intervals during the day and there may have been carelessness in the use of matches, but this is only theory and there is no direct circumstantial evidence to show the origin of the fire.

This was one of the largest as well as one of the most complete stock barns to be built in the valley. It was 55x100 feet in size, had a stone basement and immense storage room for stock and feed. It was supplied with water piped to the basement and equipped with electric lights all of which were enclosed in safety devices. The building was erected by C. B. Wade, former owner of the ranch, at a cost of \$5500. It was built especially for the keeping of thoroughbred stock in which industry Mr. Wade was extensively interested during the time he owned the ranch. There was insurance of \$4000 on the barn and contents and this amount, according to the judgment of those who have experience in such matters, will scarcely more than half cover the actual loss.

The French war office reported successes on the left wing of the western front. The German office said the allies had been repulsed.

The Belgian office reported that they were successfully repulsing the Germans before Antwerp.

A new battle line which extended from Mariampol to Osowita, in Russian Poland, has been formed by the Russians, and terrific fighting was reported from the entire front.

Rome reported that Rumanian railroads were congested with German troops being rushed to check this Russian advance.

A German squadron was reported by Petrograd to have bombarded the port of Windau.

The German war office posted its thirty eighth casualty list containing the names of 8,000 officers and men killed, wounded or missing.
